MIDDLE EAST

In the Middle East - a major break today in that Arab and Israeli impasse. With Jordan and Israel both agreeing to permit a return of Arab refugees - to their former homes on the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan River.

The mass return - set to begin tomorrow. With Red Cross officials in Amman, Jordan - predicting that close to two hundred thousand Arabs will take advantage of the agreement. Israeli authorities the county that free passage will end - as of August thirty-one.

At the same time - another concession today from the Israeli government; heading off the Threat of a religious clash - in the walls of the city of Jerusalem.

As you may have heard - Israeli occupation forces were planning to hold services Saturday -- in the famed Haram El Shariff; an enclosure containing the dome of the rock and the Mosque of El Aksa - two of the holiest

shrines in all Islam. But in view of mounting protest from Moslems -- those services now cancelled.

Also on the credit side - a report today from Alexandria, Egypt. Where President Tito of Jugoslavia - today concluded his personal peace mission to the Arab world.

Before sailing for home on his personal yacht
Tito telling of assurances from three of Israel's most

hostile neighbors -- Egypt, Syria and Iraq, Assurances

that they are determined - as he put it - "to find a political

solution" to the current Middle East crisis.

Tito adding his own conclusion - to the effect that non-aligned powers must play a major role - in any Mideast peace settlement.

SARAJEVO FOLLOW ALEXANDRIA

While President Tito was thus occupied -- his

fellow countrymen were having troubles a=plenty back in

Yugoslavia. Namely - an invasion of field mice - in the

Province of Bosnia. Hundreds of thousands - perhaps

millions- of field mice - advancing in a hungry phalanx.

Devouring hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of crops
and, at last report, only six miles from the city of

Sarajevo.

Yugoslav authorities trying everything to stop

them - but so far nothing seems to work, short of poison which they are reluctant to use in farmland. However,

city officials in Sarajevo are massing vast amounts of

poison - in case it's needed as a last resort.

Where did the mice all come from? Conservationists explaining that farmers and hunters - have killed off foxes and other natural enemies of the mice in recent years.

Noting, what's more, that a female mouse can reproduce - at the rate of three hundred young per year.

On the war front - American ground troops to the attack again today in Vietnam. In one engagement - US Marines storming and capturing an enemy hilltop command post; in a drive to smash a new Viet Cong build-up on the coastal plain south of Da Nang. In a second battle nearby - US paratroopers calling in reinforcements; in an effort to cut off xx escape routes for a Viet Cong regiment believed trapped in rugged, rolling hill country.

Back at Saigon - an American spokesman ferring enemy losses at nearly two hundred men; in the recent fighting.

Lighting.

By order of President Johnson - the State of

Alaska today was declared officially a major disaster

area. Clearing the way for immediate release - of a

million dollars in federal flood relief funds; badly needed
in the flood-stricken city of Fairbanks and surrounding

countryside.

The President's action - following an appeal from Alaska Governor Wally Hickel; who warned that Fairbanks would be - in his words - "a goner," - unless massive aid were forthcoming - before the onset of winter in late September.

That aid - now enroute. As Fairbanks begins the tremendous task - of pumping out the water, clearing away the rubble. Its citizens bounding back with pioneer spirit - from the record flood that claimed at least seven lives and caused untold damage.

Mrs. Homer Morris - one of the hardy breed.

Though her clot hes, her furniture, even her house were

washed away - Mrs. Morris asserting: "This is our home.

We love it and we want to stay - regardless of a little high water."

Reveat home*-Big city rioting flared anew early today - in Houston and Syracuse. Houston police now reporting the situation -- ** under control. However, Syracuse Mayor William Walsh -- tonight clamping a curfew on two racially *** troubled sections of that city; hoping to head off - another night of burning and looting.

From Trenton, New Jersey -- a final accounting today; on those two days of summit meetings last June - at Glassboro State college.

In answer to a number of press inquiries -New Jersey State Treasurer John Kervick setting total
cost at just over twenty five thousand dollars. Including,
incidentally, a little item of six thousand -- for restoring
the floor of a gym used as a press room. With state and
federal agencies - expected to share the burden about
fifty-fifty.

"Putting a price tag on an event of such international significance" - perhaps "rather unusual" = admitted Kervick. But, "I am sure" - he went on - "that no one would sk disagree --it was money well spent."

Killer Taal - again on the loose. Reports from the Philippines telling today of shooting fireballs every five seconds - from that dread Taal volcano. In addition, clouds of steam and fine ash - spewing forth from the thousand-foot peak. To the accompaniment of threatening rumbles - thundering across the countryside.

According to the Philippine volcanology commission - another cruption now apparently just a matter of time. So they've evacuated hundreds of families - living in the shadow of Killer Taal. Moping to avoid a repetition of the catastrophe two years ago - when a hundred-and ninety died in a fiery sea of lava.

We all know the story - about curiosity and the cat. Now comes the story of one Robert Morris of Newark, New Jersey - apparently a victim of the same affliction.

According to police - Morris was visiting friends in their new sealed-up, air-conditioned apartment building, when he became intrigued - by a floor-to-ceiling picture with a sweeping view; a fixed window -- supposedly crashproof, shatterproof and all other kinds of proof.

Morris banging the window several times with his hands - and, sure enough, it seemed as sturdy as claimed. Whereupon he backed up - and hurled himself at the pane. Too hard - much too hard. A clatter of glass - a scream - and then silence. Minutes later

They found him dead - a few minutes later; on the street - foorteen stories below.
