It is hard to think of comedy at a Red trial, with its atmosphere of terror and execution. But there were roars of laughter in the courtroom today at Sofia, capital of Bulgaria - that headline trial which has been astonishing all along.

The chief defendant refusing to confess
Kostov, former number two Bulgarian Semmunist

repudiating the admissions of guilt he made to the pulk
police.

confessed - in the usual way at a Communist trial. The star today was a millionaire, who joined the Communist Party, and rose high in the Red Government. Today he accused Eostov. He told how he first met the number two Communist and was impressed, describing him in these words - "An intelligent man, unlike other Communists." That got a laugh.

The witness then continued: "I found Kestev an intelligent man with whom one could reach an understanding," "My friends and I agreed," he went on,

"that, if all Communists were like that, even we industrialists would become Communists." The spectators roared with laughter, and the Red judge had to bang his gavel for order.

The story explained - how the millionaire became a Communist. He joined the party, and rose to the post of director of the state rubber industry. But, said he today, Eostov persuaded him to sabotage the rubber program.

The proceedings today ended the series of confessions - everybody's except Kostov's whose astonishing defiance continues to excite an almost incredulous wonder.

From London today, we have a story of the downfall of that number two Communist - a catastrophe that began with a small, seemingly trivial event.

Fantastic - how some minor detail can lead to overwhelming results.

Mestov really ran Red Bulgaria. The premier was Dmitrov, but that veteral big-shot, so long in the

high favor of Stalin, was ill-dying about a year ago.

Kostov was the boss of the Bulgarian Communist Party,
and his personal secretary was the minister of police meaning everything in a police state. He was the

Communist theorist in Bulgaria, and right now the

Reds in that country are busy with a purge of their own
literature - because it was write by Kostov.

Then came some trade negotiations with
Soviet Russia, during which Kostov did not tell the
Soviet trade delegation the actual cost of certain
articles of merchandise in question - keeping the
figures a secret. He explained that he was required
by law to keep them a secret. To which the Soviets
replied in an official statement: 'The supposition
that the law for official secrets could in any way be
applied to the Soviet Union - is dangerous.' That
was the beginning of the downfall of Kostov - opposing
the Soviets on that one point.

YEGOSLAVIA

Prison sentences were imposed today in the Tugoslav Red trial - which presented the unusual spectacle of Soviet agents being tried before a Communist court. The defendants are White Russians, who confessed that they went over to the Soviet side and did Moscow spy work. Ten of them - and today they were given prison sentences ranging from three to twenty years.

In the Soviet zone of Berlin, the Red police held a Yugoslav military mission prisoners for seventeen hours. Yesterday, those representatives of Marshal Tito were ordered out, but today they were stopped as they tried to leave. They sought to take their belongings with them, but the Red police wouldn't let them. The whole thing ended with members of the military mission and their families fleeing to the Vestern zone.

Hitherto. the Tugoslav Government had maintained this mission in the Soviet zone of Germany - as a matter of regular diplomatic routine. But the revolt of Red Marshal Tito against Moscow puts an end to the usual protocol. So the Tugoslavs, ordered out, then held in confinement, - finally free.

The chancellor of Vestern Germany issues a virtual demand that German military units be included in any Vestern European army. Chancellor Admaner has been intimating the same sort of thing for the past few days - which has been embarrassing to the Vestern Allies, because the Vest German Government has made the most positive kind of pledge to remain demilitarised, and have no army.

I suppose the Gormans argue that military units in a Vestern European army would not violate the pledge, though it does look as if the Germans, with their long military tradition, might have a sneaking desire for soldiers.

Over in Germany, the thunder of the gun has died down to a mere pop, hardly louder than a lively champaigne cork. The gun, that is, which hitherto has roared in salute at American headquarters, Frankfurt.

The reason - a letter from a German housewife who lives across the street. Frau Werner Schnelle wrote to American headquarters, complaining that the noise of the saluting gun was driving her to distraction. "If you should live here," wrote Frau Schnelle, "you would also lose your nerves sometimes. Every morning at seven, we are nearly falling out of our beds. The whole house is shaking and the windows are nearly breaking. Even on Sunday," she goes on, "this shot is fired - and all illusion of a quiet Sunday is for some time gone."

BRITAIN

The British election today merely continues

Parliament left vacant by the death or retirement of
a Labor M. P.

Tomorrow - Australia goes to the polls, and it's one of the hettest political fights on record.

The conversatives are trying to overthrow a Labor Government in the land down under - and are much encouraged by the overthrow of Socialist Labor in New Zealand. Late word from Sidney pictures the Australian election as the closest kind of fight.

The trial of Alger Hiss came to a new turn this evening. Hitherto the case against the former high official in the State Department has been pretty much a repetition of the first Hiss trial which resulted in a hung jury. But today evidence was given by Mrs. Hede Massing, former wife of Gerhardt Eisler, the big-time Soviet agent who skipped bail and fled this country. At the first trial, Mrs. Massing, was not permitted to testify -- the judge excluding her evidence. But today, in the second trial, it was different, and the former wife of Gerhardt Eisler identified Alger Hiss as the leader of Soviet espionage in the United States government.

in competition with the espionage outfit run by Hiss
in the State Department. They had a meeting, and
discussed a State Department employee named Moel

"I said to Mr. Hiss, 'I understand you are trying to get Moel Field away from my organization into yours'." Hiss replied that they would see who would win out.

She says that last December the F.B.I. brought her face to face with Hiss -- who declared that he did not recognise her.

Point by point she corroborated the testimony of Whittaker Chambers, Chief Accuser of Alger Hiss, who had previously declared that Hiss had competed with the wife of Gerhardt Eisler for the emplonage services of Noel Field.

Sounds like testimony with serious meaning for the high State Department official, who was an adviser to the late President Roosevelt in the conference with Stalin at Talta.

PARNELL THOMAS
