By the time police arrived -- the abductor was dead Amazingly though -- Mrs. Caldwell was still alive. At last report in serious condition -- but she is expected to live.

SPACE

On the space front -- Russian scientists successfully today for the Soviet Union. Russian scientists successfully completing - history's first automated docking in space.

With two unmanned spacecraft launched days apart -- locking automatically in a single orbit around the earth.

The two satellites said to be prototypes of Russia's new Soyuz spacecraft -- to be used in later manned flight.

Indeed, Russia quickly calling today's feat -- the initial step toward the building of a permanent space platform.

American scientists adding that it could serve equally well -- as the first step toward a circum-Lunar flight; that is, a flight around the moon and back -- without landing.

Be that as it may -- this the first known launching a Soyuz spacecraft -- since the death of Soviet Cosmonaut Vladimir Komarox in just such a ship -- last spring. The flight thus considered a test of new, improved equipment -- which apparently worked to perfection.

Meanwhile, in Moscow - the Kremlin today threw cold water on another peace move. Soviet Premier Kosygin rejecting the idea of reconvening that Nineteen Fifty-Four Geneva sonference - of which Russia was co-chairman. Asserting it would be "unreal" to hope for peace through such a move -- because neither North Vietnam nor the Viet Cong were necessary.

Kosygin further reaffirming Soviet support - of
Hanoi's stated conditions for any peace talks. These to
include a U S bombing halt - withdrawal of all troops and full recognition for the Viet Cong. The Soviet Premier
adding: "our sympathies, our moral and political support
and our aid - are completely on the side" of the Viet Cong
and the North Vietnamese.

At Stockholm, Sweden - the year's latest list of
Nobel Prize-winners was announced today. The group
headed by -- Professor Hans Albrecht Bethe of Cornell
University; winner of the Nobel Prize for physics -- for
his work in unlocking some of the seeses secrets of the
sun.

A native of Germany - Professor Bethe fled his nomeland just a jump ahead of the Nazis; here in the United States & help to develop the hydrogen bomb.

Now become America's twenty-seventh - Nobel prize-winner for physics.

At the same time - the Nobe! prize for chemistry was awarded today to box two Britons and a West German.

But For the second straight year - there will be no Nobel Peace prize. The Norwegian Parliament - which rules in this category - relaying its "no" verdict from Oslo.

Why - they never say. Observers noting, however, that Nineteen-Sixty has been anything but peaceful.
