The President, said he, has sent so many far-fetched and ridiculous proposals to Congress that its legislative machinery has collapsed. The new law liberalizes Federal aid to State-administered programs - but puts new stress on rehabilitation, to get people off relief.

MACMILLAN

A hint of change in London. Prime Minister
MacMillan defended his young, new cabinet in the House of

ALGERIA

Ben Della - seeking to give the impression he cannot be stopped, ^{says} he's backed by a forty thousand man army, and ^{is} sending his Chief Lieutenant Mohammed Khider to Algiers to start taking over the government.

But Khider will let the pressure build up slowly. He's driving the four hundred miles from Oran to Algiers - a trip over bouncy highways that could take days.

The rival factions are marking time in Algeria - no further advances toward the capitol reported by Vice-Premier Ben Della and his dissident army group.

Now, there's an unconfirmed dispatch saying that Premier supporters of Ben Khedda are marching toward Constantine - the city seized by Ben Della yesterday. Twelve hundred tough Berber troops ^{are} said to be heading for that Eastern port city --- as the new nation of Algeria gets closer to civil war.
