The mightiest underground nuclear blast in U.S.

history - now set for five o'clock, Eastern-time, Saturday

afternoon. So announced today - by the U.S. Atomic Energy

Commission. Site, of course - the Island of Amchitka up in

Alaska.

Conservationists - opposing the test all the way went defore the U.S. Court of Appeals - seeking an injunction
to halt it. But - this court - turned down again today even though the conservationists charged that the Atomic
Energy Commission had deliberately ommitted adverse views
from its public estimate of the environmental impact the big
blast will have.

It was revealed - for example - that President Nixon's top environmental adviser - Russell Train - had stated - that the blast on Amchitka Island could set off a chain of earth quakes - like a line of falling dominoes - and perhaps send a

tidal wave across the Pacific ocean.

Now - the opponents of the blast - are left to consider - whether to take their appeal to the Supreme Court.

Time is short.

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President Nixon's two new appointees to the U.S.

Supreme Court - both endorsed today by a twelve-man

committee of the American Bar Association. Virginia's

Lewis Powell Junior - received rating of "highest qualified"

from all twelve. The Justice Department's William Rehnquist

- getting a similar rating from nine of the twelve.

This was announced - at the start of confirmation hearings by the Senate Judiciary Committee. Chairman Eastland adding that a full investigation by the FBI - has shown both Rehnquist and Powell to be "clean, high-class gentlemen." So far - so good.

Defense Secretary Melvin Laird - an arrival today at Saigon; where he promptly expressed confidence - that the U.S. Congress will soon enact a new foreign aid bill. Laird saying: "As we meet with the Soviet Union and as we meet with the People's Republic of China - this is the time to show strength, not weakness." A message clearly intended to reassure the Saigon government - one of the chief beneficiaries of U.S. foreign aid.

But the main purpose of Laird's visit - we are told is to determine the speed and extent of future troop withdrawals.

In this connection, Laird discussed the U.S. casualty report
for the past week - to be announced tomorrow; saying it will
show "the lowest casualty figure" - since Nineteen-Sixty-Five
when the U.S. first "assumed a combat role in Vietnam."

By order of Premier Brian Faulkner, police regulars and police reservists in Northern Ireland - will be permitted, henceforth, to carry guns on regular duty. The Premier finally giving his okay today - in the face of a threatened police mutiny. This following the machinegun slaying - of two Relfast detectives; the latest of more than three hundred attacks on traditionally unarmed police - since the current violence in Ulster began in Nimeteen-Sixty-Nine.
