The British insisted - that an Anglo-French salvage fleet must play its part in reopening the Canal. With British and Prench crews - and escorted by warships. Nasser's Bgyptians refusing - to let the British and Prench crews have any part in the job.

Under the compromise, today, the British concede the saivage fleet will not be escorted by warships. The

Bgyptians agreeing - to the British and French crews. Both sides animated, apparently - by a desire to got the Canal open quickly.

Word is now - that they'll clear a passage for
ordinary cargo ships in two months. For ofl tankers up to
ten thousand tons - in four-and-a-half months. Complete clearance
and repair of damage - in about seven months.

More terrorist attacks at Port Said. Three assaults -
with hand-grenades. Several Ers Egyptians wounded - no British
casualties.

In one attack - a grenade, hurled at a British
military vehicle, bounced back and injured the Egyptian who
threw it.
At another place in Port Said, a grenade was thrown Into a truck filled with Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. The soldiers kicked it out of the trick, and the grenade exploded in the street. Wounding - two Rgyptian passersby.
Meanwhile, UN and Egyptian sources indicate - that
the Anglo-French withdrawal may be completed tomorrow. But
British and French officials declare - some of their troops will remain at port said over the weekend.

Prime Minister Anthony Eden - returned to London,today.

Looking in tip-top physical condition - after his three week rest in Jamaica, as a cure for "over-strain".

At the airport, he faced news reporters and caneras,
and issued a statement - endorsing all the measures taken by the

Cebinet, while he was away. Including the withdrawal of Anglo-French forces from Suez.

He faced the challenge - of the "Suez rebels".

Right Wingers of his own conservative party, who launched a
"ditch Eden" movement. The "Suez rebels" - angry about the
Withdrawal of the invasion forces. A challenge - that's dying
But, Sir Anthony faces a new danger - developing
today. The resignation of Sir Edward Boyle - Economics

Secretary of the Treasury. Protesting the fact - that Britain
intervened in Suez at all.

In a speech at Birmingham, today, Sir Edward Boyle
raised the charge - that there had been "collusion" between

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Israel, Britain and France. "It is," he declared, "the one
crucial question that has not been answered." The question - of
collusion.

British indignation over the American Suez Canal policy．


American military attache－evicted from his London home．
This was the doing of the renting agent for the

When the playwright heard the news，he sent a message

Meanwhile，British newspapers continue to denounce the ant1－American campaign．贸 which－another example got
into the news，today．An automobile dealer at Herfordshire hanging out a sign：＂No Americans served here．＂

Today, the London News Chronicle gave its opinion of that sort of thing. "It's just nasty and stupid", said the newspaper. "It's an insult to the reputation of Great Britain."

Budapest - quiet, on the surface at zas least.

Today, the strike was ending - workers going back to their jobs. Except, at a big furniture factory. The food situation - much improved by the arrival of forty carloads of provisions. People doing Christmas shopping - under a clear, cold sky.

But, outside the city, continued fighting. The only real news we have is from the Red Radio - which tells of battles at various places.

At a town near the Czech border - Russian troops were
attacked, and a gunfight ensued. The Red Radio says - the

Russians set fire to a theatre, occupied, apparently, by the insurgents.

At the town of Eger, in Central Hungary - patriots
attacked a government building with hand-grenades. Inflicting heavy damage.

The Red Radio mentions the name of an insurgent
leader, Baranzy. Who has not, previcusly, figured in the news.
Maybe we'll be hearing more about him - Baranzy.
disturbances in Poland. Saying - that these, in many cases, grow out of election campaign disputes. Poland - preparing for a battle of ballots, scheduled for January I'wentieth. The first election in years - of a democratic sort. Not - a totalitarian, one-party travesty. Verious pairiles - in the political campaign. With electioneering clashes - between the Peasant Party and the Communist faction of the government. Political oratory - turning into riots.

But sometimes, says the/dispatch, both parties will join, in demonstration against the Soviet savagery in Hungary. Thereby - getting into battles with the Red police. The worst riot was in Stettin - where a Polish crowd attacked the Soviet Consulate. Yesterday - a mob, shouting anti-Soviet slogans, stormed a local police station. Beating up - a chief of Red police.
 Word from Warsaw is - that, in the Polish provinces, seven policemen have been killed in the last five days.

At the U.N., eleven Arab nations make the charge - that the Israelis are applying - "scorched earth" methods in the Sinai Peninsula. They demand that U.N. Secretary General Hammarskjold investigate - reports th et the retiring Israelis have demolished roads, bridges, water tanks, wells, and villages.

Leaving - "scorched earth", as they retire slowly.
In Jerusalem, indications that the Israelis will
refuse to pull back their troops any farther. Unless - they
receive guarantees that Egyptian fo::ces will not reoccupy the
Sinai Peninsula. They soy they agreed on a withdrawal - only
in favor of the U.N. police force; Not - the Egyptians. Which argument will be presented - at the next meeting with U.N.


Commander, Burns.
In the U.N., meanwhile, Britain, France and Israel
are pressing for action by the world organization - on the
alleged mistreatment and expulsion of British, French and Jewish
residents in. Egypt.

Next week will tell the story - of the Democratic Advisory Committee. Will it actually come into being? or will it perish - without ever being born? That Committee, set up after the election - to advance "democratic programs and principles." Presumably - to give the "1iberals" a greater voice in Party affairs. Tonight the word is, that Democratic Netional Chairman Paul Butler will make an announcement next week. Indicating - whether, or not, the Democrats will go ahead and form the Comittee.

Thus far, the chief result of the project has been to dramatize the solit in the Democratic ranks. Northern
ttherais liberals - Southern conservatives. Those invited as members include - defeated Candidate Adlai Stevenson, former President Truman, and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt. Also - a list of governors and the chief Democrats in Congress.

Two Senators of the liberal wing have accepted -

Kefauver of Tennessee and Humphrey of Minnesota. But Senator

Lyndon Johnson, the Democratic leader in the Senats, has refused the invitation. Indicating, in effect - that the Democratic majority in Congress won't be guided by any Advisory Committee. Same kind of refusal - from Congressman Sam Reyburn of Texas, the Democratic leader in the House. No replies at all - from Senators Mike Mansfield of Montana, Trap Kennedy of Massachusetts, and George Smathers of Florida. Which makes it look bad for the Advisory Committee so far. as the conservative Democrats, and their allies, are concerned.

So, maybe, the whole thing may be abandoned - or maybe not.

A badly bungled effort, in the field of legislation, came to a sad finish, today. Attempts in behalf of the Natural Ges Bill - which produced a political storm early in the year.

The bill would have exempted independent natural gas producers from direct federal control. And the Superior 011 Company decided - they'd make some campaign contributions. Placing the matter in charge of Elmer Patman, a lawyer at Austin, Texas. Patman, in turn, hired John M. Neff of Lexington, Nebraska - to take charge in his area.

> Whereupon, Lawyer Neff offered a campaign
contribution of twenty-five hundred dollars - to Republican 8s

Senator Francis Case of South Dakota. But Case haz denounced
the offer - in a speech before the Senate. Then - voted against the bill.

The Senate, however, passed the measure. But President Eisenhower vetoed it - with a blast provoked by the offer of a campaign contribution. He said he was in favor of the Natural

Gas B111 - but was vetoing it, because of "arrogant tactics."

## COLLISION

A slam bang bus collision - between Philadelphia and

Camden, today. Twelve persons injured. None seriously, it seems. A light casualty list - considering what happened. At a street corner, one bus hit the other - broadside. Knocking it galley west. The bus that was hit, ran out of control - knocking over a fire hydrant, smashing through a traffic light standard. And - plunging through the glass window of a furniture store. Rough on the furniture display in that window, and imagine the feelings of the passengers!

Man-made satellites - with sub-satellites. That's the latest in the outer space program - to be launched next summer. Artificial moons - to be trailed, each, by other artificial moons. So announced by the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics.

Here's how it will work: The principal satellite, carried aloft by a three stage rocket, will be hurled at a tremendous velocity - into an orbit around the world. At the same time, a small balloon will be released - about the same size as the satellite, the size of a basketball. The balloon made of plastic, with an aluminum coating - and inflated with hydrogen. Trailing - man-made moon number one.

The purpose of the balloon - to test the resistance of the ratified air at the outer edge of the atmosphere. Observers able to follow it - with telescopes and radar.

The South Pole is being set up - with bright strines of orange and black. The colors to fly at the top - the Red, White and Blue. A thirteen foot flag-staff -- erected on top of the tallest building at South Pole Village.

The pole was dropped by parachute. So where did it
come from? The very opposite of the polar regions - the jungles of Panama. An equatorial bamboo staff - to mark the ultimate of the frozen South.

## PILOT

A civilian test pilot bailed out of an F-102,
today - the fastest, highest flying jet fighter in the

Air Force has. At twenty-nine-thousand feet, something went wrong - and Pilot Harry Dagan bailed out. Coming down by parachute - dropping down, down, for nearly six miles. Landing uninjured - twenty -five miles west of El Pasco, Texas. A six mile fall. How would you like to fall six miles, Henry?
