## GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

At Sioux Falls, South Dakota, today George McGovern, after a first full night's sleep in weeks, said he would never run for president again. Adding emphatically: "I really mean it."

As to what went wrong - why the number one political debacle in American history? That will be argued for years. McGovern's campaign director, Frank Mankiewicz, summed it up - saying:

"We were overwhelmed - nothing would have made a difference."

Next question: in seventy-six who will the Democratic standard bearer be? Some of the speculation of course centers on Ted Kennedy; but some say Connally of Texas to rebuild the party.

Said Mayor Lindsay of New York: "I got washed out so badly in Florida and Wisconsin, if I said 'yes'I'd run' no one would believe me, including my wife, my four children and my three friends."

At the White House today - in the wake of President Nixon's mentalmany further and the House today - in the President meeting with his classification with key aides; as well as "cabinet members and the heads of federal agencies." Ziegler futher telling newsmen: "I think you can anticipate significant reorganization of the White House and the government - in the next term." And now the latest: the President flying to Key Biscayne for a few days of rest and relaxation; there, too; to continue the
deliberations; we're told - that will help him "to organize his
second term."

Meanwhile, the reaction to the President's record win 
Soft

continued to echo and re-echo today, here at home - and right

around the globe.

The President himself calling his triumph - "the best one

of all." First Lady Pat Nixon - saying she was "happy, proud and

excited." Mail AFL-CIO President George Meany 7 saying the voters

have "overwhelmingly repudiated neo-isolationism." Adding: "they

have spoken in a loud and clear voice - they have shown that they

want peace in Vietnam, but not surrender and not dishonor."

Overseas, the Communist side at Paris peace talks - was again the accusing/President of stalling on a cease-fire. Also, saying the U.S. election - was strictly an internal affair.

But elsewhere in Europe, Asia and Africa - the President's victory was widely acclaimed. With even the Kremlin - sending along it's official congratulations. And the Communist Party newspaper in Hungary - observing that "peace in Vietnam never seemed as near as it does now."

Perhaps nowhere though was the President's victory more welcome than it was in Saigon. South Vietnam Foreign Minister Tran Van Lam
saying: "We are sure we will have a very good friend - in the person
of President Nixon." Adding: "This is a very happy day - not only
for the American people but also the Vietnamese people."

In addition to the various races decided yesterday - a long list of referendums were also on the ballot. In California, for example, the voters approving a reinstatement of the death penalty- for certain "heinous" crimes. Also, voting two to one - against the legalization of marijuana.

Here in Colorado - the voters cutting off all state - for the Nineteen Seventy-Six Winter Olympics. funds Lake Placid, New York, site of the Ninetecn-Thirty-Two Olympica, wants it; but it my go to Europe where the only likely countries who would be eligible are Italy, Switzerland, Colorado and Norway. Richard Goodwin, head of the committee adding sadly: "The voters did a very, very foolish thing but I can't find it in me to work against themandate of the people." I'm in Colorado tonight and without exception everyone I've met is in a state of shock. They fought for it. They got - and now look what has happened? Some say

maybe Uncle Sam would like to take it on - maybe for the

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fabulous Mineral King area in the Tigh Sierra.

I've just come from Alaska where every airman - and most

Alaskans are - have given up hope for the two Congressmen, Hale

Boggs and Nick Begich, now missing for three weeks. I flew over

the mountains where they might have gone down; once in a small plane

with Lowell, Junior. Even so Nick Begich has been re-elected. And

down in Louisiana - the same for House Majority Leader Hale Boggs.

The second time in history, I believe, for Congressmen presumed dead,

to be re-elected.

A final note on the election - from Dr. Benjamin Spock; who ran for president - as the candidate of the People's Party. Dr. Spock admits he garnered only a handful of votes - twenty-one thousand out of seventy-two million.

"But - we're not discouraged" - said he. Adding: "if you really stop to think about it - we only carried two less states than McGovern."

How's that for optimism, John? Bill?

And then there was New York's Bella Abzug - like a phoenix risen from the ashes, winning re-election to Congress. When it was suggested she might care to pay a visit to local McGovern headquarters, since she had been a staunch McGovern supporter, Bella replied, "A victory doesn't go to a funeral." And so long until tomorrow.
