The French government has put aside the proposal

made by Indian Prime Minister Nehru, for an immediate armistice in Indo-China. Today, Premier Laniel told the Mix National Assembly in Paris, that the question of a crease-fire was too complicated for any prompt action.

He summarized the French conditions for a truce, which six call for the Reds to evacuate large areas. Laniel - settlement that these could not be negotiated, in advance of the Geneva Conference.

The Premier said he pinned his hope on that meeting of the Big Four, together with Red China. Hope - that a settlement of the Indo-Chinese War may be reached at Geneva.

Meanwhile, in Washington, U.S. Foreign Aid Chief
Harold Stassen stated that more than a billion dollars of
U.S. military aid will be sent to Indo-China this year help for the French against the Reds.

The Navajo tribe has broken an age-old tradition.

At Window Rock, Arizona, the tribal council debated the issue for ten hours - the longest pow-wow in the history of the Navajos. Then they voted - to violate their ancient rule.

The Navajos have a traditional ceremony called "the blessing way." A nine-day ritual, in which the tribal
history is enacted, with symbolism expressing the Navajo
philosophy of life. Its esoteric meaning - a secret. With

lore of the tribe, including the secret of that nine-day ritual - "the blessing way." So now permission to publish has been granted - by the Navajo tribal council.
