EARTHQUAKE /T.- Deco Th an. ape. 7-58.
All accounts agree - that the earthquake reported $\sigma$ today, was one of the most powerful in history. Seismographic needles, far and wide - were knocked galley west.

The terrific earth shocker - in Alaska, somewhere
 tundra, Alaskan wilderness. The quake - felt only mildly in Alaskan cities, like Fairbanks and Anchorage.

At first, the seismologists made all sorts of
guesses - about the location of the trembler, which was knocking their needles around. Some thought - South America. But then it became evident - that the shocks were from the north, in the vast Alaskan wilderness.

The Russians report a giant iceberg. Calling it -
"the largest discovered in our century." Spotted - by the Soviet Antarctic expedition.

> A Russian plane - flying over the ocean, off the

Shackleton glacier. When they caught sight of an iceberg of almost incredible dimensions. Fifty-four miles long - eighteen miles wide, and one hundred and twenty feet high. The supposition being - that the giant had split off from the iceshelf near the glacier. Now - drifting around on the polar ice.

Tonight, in the sky over the Pacific, approaching the American coast - a huge Air Force plane, a jet strato-tanker. Out to set - non-stop speed and distance records. Flying, without refueling, from Japan - to Spain.
*k A high ranking officer at the controls Brigadier General William Fubank of Welsh, West Virginia. On a flight - of more than eleven thousand miles. From the Yokoto Air Force base, Japan - to Madrid.

If that plane fails to make it, another strato-tanker will take off - to set the records.

One dispatch on the news wire, today, features two simple words - "fail safe". An engineering expression, indicating - a final precaution against error. Used, in this case - by the U.S. Air Force. To make sure - that a world war will not be touched off by mistake.

Frank Bartholomew, President of the United Press, tells about the Strategic Air Command; nerve center - for long range atomic bombing in case of war; Where the problem was presented:

A warning comes from the Dewline - that Arctic chain of radar bases. Some unidentified object has been picked up on a Dewline radar screen. Maybe an enemy bomber or missile or, maybe, just a meteor, or some other innocent object.

But there's no delay. Our atomic bombers take off immediately - on their way to strike at enemy targets. Flying according to the pattern of attack.

This, they say, has happened more than once. The bombers always a called back - when they found the suspicious

object entirely innocent. But, suppose, a bomber should not get the "call back" signal. Some accident, some failure with communications. Well, the pilot would just keep going - on his mission of atomic bombing.

Sounds as if an atomic war might be touched off by that kind of mistake. But that's where "fail safe" comes in. The bomber flies on for a certain length of time - waiting for confirmation of the order to attack. Then, if he doesn't get
it, he turns around - returning to his base.
The time limit - the safeguard. So that a failure of communications would not result in an accidental atomic war.

A helicopter crash - reported at the atomic proving grounds in the Far Pacific. gempresentists, attached to the forthcoming nuclear tests - were aboard the helicopter. The crash - killing Dr. Mark Mills of the Radiation Laboratory of the University of California. One other atomic scientist injured. The remainder of the passengers and crew - unharmed.

## MICHIGAN CRASH

An investigation is on - to determine the cause of the air disaster in Michigan, yesterday. A British built airliner - crashing in a snowstorm near the Tri-City Airport. Forty-seven persons aboard - no survivors.

At the moment it's a mystery - why the plane, coming in to land, plunged into a cornfield a third of a mile from the runway. Mechanical failure - human failure? There's no telling

Today, the Supreme Court threw out the case - to cancel the American citizenship of Frank Costello; fften called - the "Prime Minister of the underworld." The high tribunal - rejecting the measure, which would have enabled the federal authorities to deport Costello back to his native Italy.

Actually, the Justices did not rule on the merits of the case - at all. Did not even refer - to the arguments was presented by the Department of Justice. Or the defense advanced by Costello's lawyers.

The trouble was - the government was remiss, failing to comply with necessary formality. The law requiring what is called - an "affidavit of good cause." A sworn declaration that the government has legal evidence to back up its own charges.

This should have been filed at the time the Department
of Justice began its proceedings. But it wasn't, So the denaturalization proceedings against Costello - are thrown out.

However, the big-shot is not in the clear - not by any means. He faces - five years in prison for income tax evasion.
CBS - having a strike, tonight. Technicians -
walking out. The network - doing its best to continue operations William Pits, CBS Vice-President in charge of labor relations, a denies Union statement - that "job security" is the reason for the strike. Declaring - that it's a case of exorbitant wage demands and Union insistence on an "uneconomic use of manpower."

The big anti-atomic march in Britain - didn't live up to its name, today. Called - a "peaceful" demonstration; violence broke out - a riotous uproar.

The long column, numbering five thousand marchers, arrived at the Aldermaston Center for Atomic WeaponsResearch, Carrying placards, "Ban the $H$-bomb", and chanting slogans $\Lambda_{\Lambda}-a$ that Britain stop all nuclear testing; when they spotted - a truck with a sign reading: "Khrushchev Bunion Derby." And a loud speaker - blaring much the same thing.

The peaceful marchers didn't like that, and some of them attacked the truck. Tearing down the sign - "Khrushchev Bunion Derby." Dragging the driver of the truck - and beating nim; London free lance writer, Norris McWhirter, who had been conducting a campaign against the anti-atomic march.

Police intervened - and, after a battle, rescued
McWhirter; ho said: "It was like being in a lion's den although they are supposed to be doves of peace." The whole thing ended in a huge rally outside the atomic research plant.

Addressed - by Paster Martin Niemoeller, the German clergyman, who was an anti-Nazi leader in the time of Hitler. Paster Niemoeller - making an address in the style of a revival meeting. he shouted,
Declaring: "The only holy war"/ "is a war for peace on earth."
Which might remind us - of World War one. When the
slogan was - "a war to end all wars."

Havana, today, was plastered with signs - that a general strike is in the offing. The rebel underground urging people to put in supplies, in preparation for a tie-up.

> The strike is on already in the city of Camaguey,
an important center of highways and communications. With
reports in Havana - of extensive sabotage on the railroad line near Camaguey. A tie-up in that area - would isolate the eastern third of Cuba.

Meanwhile, the Batista government reports military successes against Fidel Castro's rebels in Oriente Province the insurgent stronghold. But there's no further word of a government claim - that Castro, with a force of rebels, has been trapped.

On Sumatra, the forces of the Indonesian government claim successes. The rebels admitting that enemy troops captured a town on the way to a vital road junction. The insurgents adding - that their own forces drove back govement soldiers, who were attempting to cross a strategic river.

In Washington, the State Department expresses regret - that the Sukarno government at Jakarta is getting supplies of armament from Communist sources.

At Windsor Castle, yesterday, Princess Margaret had a long talk with her sister, Queen Elizabeth. The royal family celebrated Easter together - and, in the afternoon, Prince Philip took the royal children for a walk. While the two sisters were alone - for a two-hour confabulation. Nobody knows what they talkedabout. But leave it to London - to have plenty of rumors. One surmise being - that Princess Margaret may become governor of one of the British Commonwealth countries. Which - would break a precedent. The tradition being - for a prince to become a royal governor. But not - a princess.

However, they say that Margaret, now twenty-seven years old, is lonesome. Not surprising - after the way her romance with Group Captain Townsend has been broken off.

So she'd like to have something to do - more than the usual royal round of laying cornerstones and attending banquets in Britain.

Princess Margaret, in fact, is now scheduled for a series of travels. A Caribbean tour, this month - and, in July, she'll visit Canada. There's also talk that she may make a trip to British possessions in the Pacific. So, now, on top of this, reports that the Queen may name her - a royal governor, somewhere in the British Commonwealth.

But there's another line of rumor - that Margaret, in the course of her travels, may marry Townsend quietly and settle down some place abroad. Following the example of her uncle, the Duke of Windsor. Who, after his marriage to the Duchess, became Governor of Jamaica.

Nova Scotia - having Easter, today. That is, Easter weather - the kind that flooded the east coast of the United States, yesterday. The rainstorm - moving north during the night. Violent winds and a downpour of rain bringing new threats for NovaScotia. Where they had still another kind of trouble over the weekend.
