SUKARNO

At Jakarta - the disintegration of Sukarno continued today - in full public view. The President-for-life - hero of the great revolution - making a spectacle of himself at coronomies installing a new twenty-seven man obbinet.

With foreign diplomate and newsmon present - Scherno bursting into an emotional tyrade against those who would question his authority. Waving his arms - stamping his feet - finally kicking off his shoes. Polling his audience: "Listen carefully and make no more mistakes about this. I am still President. I am still Premier."

Apparently to prove the point - Sukarmo maming two of his old-time supporters to figure-head posts in the new government. Also declaring that Indonesia's "confrontation" with Malaysia - will continue indefinitely; despite peace efforts - by new military

strongman General Subarto.

Subarto himself - a member of the audience; displaying no guietly smotion - but later, indicating that Sukarno was all wet. On the question of that so-called "confrontation" with Malaysia, for example - Subarto Mating at the possibility of formal approval of a peace treaty - within the maxt two weeks.

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## VIETNAM

That two-week-old "Operation Hastings" -- near the no-man's-land between North and South Vietnam -- apparently not over. Three days of comparative quiet ending today -in another Communist attempt at massive infiltration.

Fortu tely, a U.S. Marine patrol -- ready and waiting. The Leathernecks calling in an artillery strike -- on the first wave of advancing enemy troops. Later crawling to within earshot -- of the fallen Viet Cong: waiting until some two hundred more of the enemy moved in -- trying to retrieve the weapons and bodies of their fallen comrades. Then a second call -- and a second strike. Marine planes -- completing the rout. The Viet Cong leaving behind -- some sixty dead. Meanwhile, in Saigon -- casualty figures for the last week showing enemy losses -- of nearly thirteen hundred men. More than three times -- the total of American, South Vietnamese, South Korean, Australian and New Zealand losses -- all combined.

RUSK FOLLOW VIETNAM

Here at home - another attempt today by Secretary of State Dean Rusk; to spell out in simplest terms - the basis of U.S. policy in Vietnam.

Dean Rusk observing that the United States is committed by treaty - to the defense of forty nations around the globe. A committment - said he - that "is the principal pillar of peace

in the present world situation."

If were to fail in our plonge to defend South Vietnam -A he went on - the Communists could logically contend that all American alliances are "just a bluff." In that event - said he there would be fittle chance of avoiding World War III. British Prime Minister Harold Wilson -- enroute tonight to the United States; for two days of sensitive talks -- with president Johnson.

Despite mounting opposition at home -- Wilson is expected to offer Britain's continued qualified support of U.S. policy in Vietnam.
