SUKARNO

At Jakarta - the disintegration of Sukarno continued today - in full public view. The President-for-life - hero of the great revolution - making a spectacle of himself at ceremonies installing a new twenty-seven man cabinet.

With foreign diplomats and newsmen present - Sukarno bursting into an emotional ~~tyr~~ tirade against those who would question his authority. Waving his arms - stamping his feet - finally kicking off his shoes. ^{then} Telling his audience: "Listen carefully and make no more mistakes about this. I am still President. I am still Premier."

Apparently to prove the point - Sukarno naming two of his old-time supporters to figure-head posts in the new government. Also declaring that Indonesia's "confrontation" with Malaysia - will continue indefinitely; despite peace efforts - by new military strongman General Suharto.

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Suharto himself - a member of the audience; displaying no emotion - but later ^{quietly} indicating that Sukarno was all wet.

On the question of that so-called "confrontation" with

Malaysia, for example - Substantiating at the possibility of formal approval of a peace treaty - within the next two weeks.

RUSK FOLLOW VIETNAM

Here at home - another attempt today by Secretary of State Dean Rusk; to spell out in simplest terms - the basis of U.S. policy in Vietnam.

Dean Rusk observing that the United States is committed by treaty - to the defense of forty nations around the globe. A commitment - said he - that "is the principal pillar of peace in the present world situation."

If [^]were to fail in our pledge to defend South Vietnam - he went on - the Communists could logically contend that all American alliances are "just a bluff." In that event - said he - there would be little chance of avoiding World War III.

WILSON FOLLOW PRINCE

British Prime Minister Harold Wilson -- enroute tonight to the United States; for two days of sensitive talks -- with president Johnson.

Despite mounting opposition at home -- Wilson is expected to offer Britain's continued qualified support of U.S. policy in Vietnam.

CIA

Heated controversy over the Central Intelligence Agency -- boiled anew today in the U.S. Senate as a result of a letter to the editor of a St. Louis newspaper -- written by Richard Helms, new Director of the CIA. A letter in regard to a recent editorial in the same paper -- headlined "Brickbats for Fulbright." An editorial highly critical of the Senator from Arkansas -- for attempting to gain a role in supervision of the CIA.

Helms expressing his "pleasure" -- at reading the editorial. Further strongly praising the newspaper -- for "supporting what it believes to be right -- an opposing what it believes to be wrong."

Senator McCarthy of Minnesota; first to call attention to all this calling the letter -- "entirely out of order." Asserting that Helms "owes an apology -- to every member of the U.S. Senate." Fellow Senators quickly joining -- in expressions of shock and surprise.

CHURCH

The project - brain child of Dr. Stanley Hallett of the
Church Federation of Chicago, To be put into effect at Columbia -
because it is a brand new city. A projected community of more
than a hundred thousand persons - being built entirely from scratch -
about halfway between Washington and Baltimore.

Thus, when new residents begin moving in next year - they
will find a unique spirit of cooperation between Episcopalians,
Lutherans, Methodists, etc. All of them sharing in a new Church
complex - providing separate sanctuaries for worship - but common
facilities for all related church work

The idea - says Dr. Hallett - to get away from what he
calls - "an edifice complex." Each denomination plunging into

debt - striving to erect its own church whenever a new suburb opens up.

Time and money so expended in the past - can be far better used in the future - says Dr. Hallett; if Church-goers will only use their vast energies - in service to the entire community.
