BURMA L.T. - Deleo. Mon. May 4-59.

In Rangoon, today, four bus-loads of Burmese news reporters arrived at the Soviet Embassy. The reporters - getting out, lining up in front of the building, and shouting anti-Soviet slogans. Demanding - that the Embassy be closed.

Then they hurled a barrage of tomatoes at the building splashing it with crimson smears. Several of them - trying to get into the Embassy grounds. The Russian gate-keeper - throwing a chair at them. The Burmese newsman - hurling it back. A fight resulting - until the police broke it up.

Burmese reaction - in the affair of the Russian Embassy official. Colonel Stryguine - the military attache, who took an overdose of sleeping pills, trying to commit suicide - when told he was being sent back to Soviet Russia.

Taken to a Rangoon hospital, he was in a sort of hypnotic state, because of the sleeping pills. Shouting - anti-Communist epithets. Yelling - how much he hated Soviet Russia. After which - he tried to jump out of a window, and escape.

Yesterday, the military attache was taken forcibly by Russian guards, and placed aboard a Soviet plane. Nobody knowing - what will happen to him, when he gets back to Russia.

Burmese t news photographers, trying to get pictures, were roughed up - by Russian guards. Hence the demonstration by the newsmen - at the Soviet Embassy in Rangoon, today.

Indian Prime Minister Nehru - still bothered by the dilemma of Tibet. Telling the Parliament at New Delhi, today - that he was "shocked" by the way the Chinese Reds had been attacking him. Claiming - that India was interfering in Chinese affairs. Because Nehru granted political asylum - to the Dalai Lama.

Today, the Prime Minister told the Parliament of Indiathat, if he hadn't welcomed the spiritual and religious leader of Tibet, hundreds of millions of Indians would have been enraged.

The Communists, he said, have been making serious charges "in an irresponsible way." Nehru - surprised because he had thought the Chinese Reds were, in his words, "advanced in culture, politeness, and the gentler arts or civilization."
