night when he introduced his cabinet to the nation. Mr. Nixon seems to have learned much about this new medium-TV. As I heard someone say today - just seeing that alone almost made TV worthwhile. It was most effectively and impressibely done.

In spite of persistent reports to the contrary - We are talk, the U.S. and South Vietnam are as one on Paris peace talks. This according to U.S. chief negotiator Averell Harriman - also, South Vietnamese Vice President Ky; after a meeting today at which the two men agreed on an Allied procedural package plan - aimed at getting expanded talks finally underway.

Details of the plan - still a secret; pending presentation to the North Vietnamese delegation - at a meeting set for tomorrow. In the meantime though - another indication that Hanoi is perhaps softening its hard-line: - North Vietnamese negotiators announcing agreement for the first time - to deliver Christmas cards and packages to American prisoners-of-war.

SAIGON FOLLOW PARIS

Be that as it may - the city of Saigon is on full alert tonight. U.S. intelligence telling of nearby enemy troop concentrations - paising the threat of a third major attack on the South Vietnamese capital.

Whate here at home - the Pentagon today ordered an increase of seven thousand men - in its February draft to call. Raising the monthly quota/nearly thirty-four thousand - highest since last May.

CAPE KENNEDY

The verdict today from Cape Kennedy - "no problem."

Space officials completing a check of apparent fuel

leakage in one of the Apollo-Eight's rocket engines and

coming to the conclusion it was merely an automatic drainage
to dispose of overflow fuel.

The Apollo-Eight thus clears its final test - with flying colors. Larget date for the U.S. moonshoot - remains December Twenty-One - Saturday after next.
