The Soviet Union offered a disarmament plan to the United Nations today - and it's notable, because for the first time the Russians show a willingness to reduce conventional weapons. Until now, the Kremlin has always insisted on the destruction of atomic weapons - which would leave the Russians ahead in regular standing armies. But today, Gromyko separated the two issues - and proposed that the big powers set limits on their military strength, outside of atomic weapons.

We have no details yet. But our Ambassador to the U.N., Cabot Lodge, is said to regard the Russian proposal as important. Britain and France, not quite so impressed. But at least, it's a change from the old Soviet line.

S ays the Canadian Foreign Minister:-"Lets tell the Russians what we are going to do - and then tell them to put up or shut up." This was at today's meeting of the heads of Government of Canada, Mexico and the United States. A long conference today at White Sulfhur Springs, West Virginia. There ware no concrete decisions - but Premier St. Laurent, President Cortines and President Eisenhower and their advisors on foreign affairs were in general agreement on a common approach.

The three leaders came out of the hotel at ten fifteen A.M. There they found a battery of reporters and photographers. These President Eisenhower introduced to his 2 guests as "my firing squad". Then the three posed for the camera firing squad. After which, accompanied by their top foreign policy experts - they went back into the Greenbriar Inn for their conference.

The main suggestion today came from Lester Pearson, the Canadian Secretary of Foreign Affairs -

who said that the free world should call Russia's bluff by exchanging plans for disarmament and economic aid. That was when Foreign Minister Lester Pearson said: -"Let's tell the Russians what we are going to do - and tell Russia to put up or shut up."

The Pearson proposal was debated back and forth, with the emphasis on econimic aid for nations of the Far East.

Secretary of State Dulles gave a report on the Far East - describing what he found on his recent tour through ten nations. Our Secretary of State, optimistic - as long as we do help the nations that need it, if they are to stave off Communist aggression.

BRITAIN

The British people are warned that there will more austerity - for almost another year. The bad news, published in an official government White Paper. A few weeks ago, the Eden government introduced species anti-inflation measures. These touched off **status** public resentment - and almost brought a crisis in the government.
