Republicans $1.7-P+9$. Dee. $2-49,5$ mi.
Today brings a suggestion - that the Republican
Party change its name. Which emanates not from some idle dreamer of no political significance, but from one of the top ranking leaders of the G.O.P., Senator Bricker of Ohio - who was a Republican candidate for Vice-President in Nineteen Forty-Four.

At Columbus, today, he issued a proposal for a new line-up in politics, the formation of a new kind of party. And call it something else - not Republican.

Senator Pricker thinks that there should be an
alliance between the conservative section of the G.O.P. and the Southern Democrats, likewise conservative. Both equally opposed to the Truman Administration and what is called - "A welfare state." He mentions two names, General Eisenhower, President of Columbia University who the other day came out against the tendency to look to the government for everything. And - former Secretary of State Byrnies of South Carolina, who is waging an outspoken campaign against the spending policies of the government and the drift in the direction

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of statism.

The Ohio senator points out that both parties
are split on this all-important issue of government paternalism. Among the Democrats, the southerners are in constant revolt against the policies of the Truman
fair deal. But the Republicans are also split, declares Bricker - pointing to the fact that some Republican leaders are not so conservative, not so strong in opposing the welfare policies of the administration. He says that, with this division in the G.O.P., it is impossible to draft a satisfactory Republican platform for the Congressional elections next year.
(Senator Bricker argues that, in recent
elections, the voters have not had a clear cut chance to express themselves on the question of government - sending spending statism, and the welfare issue - because both parties are so divided on the subject.) Hence the suggestion of an amalgamation of the conservative elements of Democrats and Republicans - to form a new party with

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a new name.

Senator Pricker says that he has not placed the proposal before Senator Taft, his Ohio colleague, who is the Republican policy leader in the Senate. Nor has he mentioned it to other top leaders of the G.O.P. He merely states it as his own idea - putting it forth for national discussion.

Well, there's likely to be plenty of discussion over so drastic a notion as a G.O.P. move to form a new kind of political party - and have the name "Republican" disappear e from the Amer scan political scene. Why, everybody knows that there are tin two kinds of Americans, mostly:- Democrat and Republican! How could it be otherwise? In Gilbert and Sullivans "Iolanthe", the majestic sentry sings:
"Every little boy or girl who's born into this world alive is either a little Liberal or else a little Conservative."

Well, in Britain it's now Labor Party instead of Liberal. But you can't have such revolutionary

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changes in the U.S.A. For over here we'll always sing:
"Every little girl or boy who's born a woman
or man is either a little Democrat or else a little Republican"; wont we ?

## An important decision was handed down in

Washington today, and some of the proceedings were in the realm of - "Metaphysics." There was a lot of mitwxex philosophical discourse, described as "abstruse and recondite." The decision was on the subject of maritime union hiring halls along the waterfront - which doesn't sound so metaphysical of philosophical. But one of the star witnesses was a longshoreman named "True knowledge". He's an angel of Father Divine. Which really did raise the hiring hall dispute to a high level.

The prosy, practical part of the story is that a trial examiner of the National Labor Relations Board handed down a ruling today - that the union hiring halls on the West Coast are in violation of the Taft-Hartley Law, the ban on the closed shop. Trial examiner Irving Regosin declared that the system, itself, was not illegal, the fault being with the way the hiring halls are run. They discriminate against longshoremen who are not members of the union, and that amounts to a closed shop.

The decision was based, in large part, on
testimony given by a witness who told how, in West Coast hiring halls, he is always the last longshoreman assigned to a job, because he is not a union member. This witness was - "True Knowledge." Who said he was expelled from the union because, in the maritime strike of Nineteen Forty-Six, he refused to serve in the picket line. He couldn't co it - being a follower of Father Divine. The angels of that negro cult leader are forbidden to engage in any such hostile performance.

In his testimony today, "True Knowledge" went
into the fine points of the philosophies propounded by Father Divine. So much so that the union lawyers tried to have his testimony thrown out, because of what they called - "His frequent digressions into the realms of metaphysics."

The Trial examiner agreed that the evidence given by "True Knowledge" did seem, at times, to be - "Abstruse and recondite." But when it came to the matter of not getting a job at a hiring hall, he was - "Clear, lucid,

plausible and persuasive." In other words, he sounded like - "True Knowledge."

So that's the story of how abstruse and recondite metaphysics played a part in a cast most important in the relations of industry and the unions.

Moscow gives an explanation of the killing of an American sergeant last week by a Russian soldier, and says it was an accident. But it sounds like a strange accident, according to the Soviet version.

In Berlin, four Americans in an automobile passed accidentally into the Soviet zone, near an airfield and sergeant John F. Staff of Ramsey, Illinois, was killed by gunfire. The Soviet message today says that a Russian
guard ordered the car to stop, and shot at the tires of the car - and killed the American sergeant, who was driving. Mighty poor aim, shooting at the tires and hitting the driver - who, moreover, was shot in the head. Today this explanation was immediately rejected as "unsatisfactory." In his protest, after the killing occurred, American Commandant General Maxwell Taylor, denounced it as "senseless brutality." He called for punishment of the Russian soldier and demanded action to prevent reckless shooting in the future. Both demands are ignored by the Russian reply. So it is -

The Red trial of Stalinist began in Yugoslavia
today, amid surroundings dark and portentous. The place, the Serbian town of Sarajevo - that name so fateful in the beginnings of World War One. The courtroom - only a few blocks away from the bridge where the heir to the Austrian crown, the archduke Francis Ferdinand, and his wife, were assassinated by a terrorist. Which savage incident led to the first global conflict.

The first of eleven defendants took the witness
stand today, and he cut a figure in keeping with the surroundings - a bearded Russian orthodox priest, in stately black robes. The prosecution claims that he preached anti-Communist propaganda until a couple of years ago - when Red Marshal Tito broke with Soviet Russia. Then, he changed around, contacted Moscow espionage in Yugoslavia, and offered to do spy work for Stalin.

Today the orthodox priest denied one point
of the indictment - that he had served the Nazi gestapo during the war. But he made a full confession of Soviet

espionage, telling how he transmitted information to the Russian military attache, who was also the head of the Yugosiav branch of the Stalin secret police, the one-time ogpu. Word from the world of $\mathbf{x D}$ diplomacy is that the Soviets would invade Jugoslavia this coming spring - if they thought the United States and western Europe would stand by and do nothing about tx it.
