GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

To me, this is going to be a difficult broadcast, my last broadcast for the sponsor with whom I have been for fifteen years, the Sun Oil Company. Also, my final broadcast, for the present at any rate, over the N.B.C. network, with which I've been for seventeen years.

Joe Pew, Chairman of the Board of Sun, is sitting beside me, and has asked for a few moments of this period, so after taking a quick look at the news, I'll turn the microphene ever to him.

What has been happening in the world today? Let's see --

As I mentioned when I went on the air a few minutes ago, the head of the Sun Oil Company is with me tonight, because this is to be my final night on the air under their sponsorship. To all who are listening, I now turn you ever to my sponsor, and old friend, J.M.Pew, Jr., known far and wide as Joe Pew.

Fifteen years ago last June, Lowell Thomas first broadcast news under sponsorship of Sun Oil Company. It has been ever since a happy and uninterrupted association.

Together, with the whole-hearted cooperation of the National Broadcasting Company, we pioneered the radio news field, providing the listening public with truthful, clean, wholesome news, intelligently presented, without bias or favoritism.

Back in 1932 when Sunoco first sponsored Lowell Thomas, there were only ten full-time network news reporters and commentators.

Today, I am told, there are over 125 regular full-time news broadcasters on the four networks and that altogether some 6,000 men and women are engaged in gathering, preparing and broadcasting news over the radio facilities of this country.

This growth in news broadcasting indicates how

greatly the American people have come to rely upon radio for the news of the day and all the facts which shape our destinies.

It demonstrates need for great vigilance to assure accurate, complete, impartial and wholly objective reporting.

We of Sun Oil Company have regarded our sponsorship of this news broadcast as a great responsibility and a solemn public trust. We believe that through Lowell Thomas, with his sincerity and deep human understanding, we have filled in full measure that responsibility and trust.

It is a matter of regret to everyone in Sun Oil
Company that Lowell Thomas, a dear personal friend and valued
associate, is tonight leaving the Sunoco program. During
these years we have come to admire, respect and love him.
He has become one of us and we feel that one very close to our
hearts is leaving our group.

Lowell, our thoughts always will be with you and our sincere good wishes go with you for your happiness, health and success in whatever you may do or wherever you may go.

And I feel exactly the same way about you, Jee, and all of my Sun Oil friends, and the Mational Broadcasting Company too. You speak about back in Nineteen Thirty-Two when I first went on the air for Blue Sunoco. You mention that there were only ten full-time network news reporters and cornentators then. But, tenight willbe my last on this network, for the present at any rate, and as you know it was exactly seventeen years ago, almost to the day, that I began for N.B.C. And at that time there were no other nightly news broadcasts. T Seventeen unbroken years, the lengest continuous run of any program in the history of radio; fifteen unbroken years with Sun Oil, the lengest that any radio program has been under one sponsorship. I am extremely proud of these records, and grateful to you, and the M.B.C., and above all to our listeners, who have made it possible for all this to come to pass.

Although I deal in words, words fail me completely at this moment when I want to express my appreciation.

But I would like to take time out for a moment to tell those
who are listening something that millions already know. The
Sun Oil Company began with the father of Joe Pew, see is
The father
sitting beside mercile was a poor boy in western Pennsylvania,
who became
one of the early eil pieneers. And he and his sens and other
members of the great Pew tribe, and their associates, have
built up an organization of which every American can be proud.

We have been living through an era of endless strikes -thousands of strikes -- but in the Sun Oil Company there has
been so little labor trouble of any kind that at the mement
I can't remember any. And if you den't think that's
remarkable, well just look back ever the American scene during
the chaetic years between World War One and now.

My Sun spensors have given me complete freedom on the air. Why, for years they weren't even sure what political party I belonged to, if any. And for Joe Pew to put up with that -- I think you'll understand.

The Pews, and all the Sun Oil people, are marvelous

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folks. Of course they have all my good wishes. And now I wish I had another fifteen minutes in which to talk about the and my all pal Hugh James, Mational Broadcasting Company, In my seventeen years with them, they have given me such wenderful cooperation that I could write a book about it. To be anywhere else on the air than the N.B.C. will seem strange indeed.

And now, speaking for my spensor, and myself, this being Priday night, I'll say -- So Long, until Monday.

Other news from Palestine tells of arrests following a wild episode of robbery and killing in the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv. Underground terrorists, believed to have been members of the Stern Gang, raided Barclay's Bank in Tel Avia, killed four British policemen, and fled with six hundred thousand dollars.

The money is understood to have been payroll funds for the Palestine police, and was being taken from the bank to an armored truck. The terrorists drove up in a jeep, and opened fire with automatic weapons - at the same time throwing scare bombs to create panic. Three pairs British policemen guarding the truck were shot dead, another was killed in the pursuit of the bandits, who fled with two bags of money, six hundred thousand dollars. In a wild chase, with a pandemonium of gunfire, they were compelled to abandon one sackful of money four hundred thousand dollars! worth. This was recovered.

The latest is that two suspects have been seized, and another under suspicion has been found wounded in a hospital. Still other arrests are reported.

Vishinsky held a news conference today - and it was a wonder. None of this bourgoise business of merely answering questions the newsmen asked him. Vishinsky delivered a harangue. With the same violent brand of shouting oratory that he uses in addressing the General Assembly of the United Mations, he hurled a tirade. There's a famous old story of what Queen Victoria said about her ponderous, pontifical Prime Minister, the great Gladstone. The Queen remarked that Mr. Gladstone talked to her as though he were addressing a public meeting. Well, Vishinsky talked to the news conference as if he were making a speech to a Red rally, in Madison Square Garden.

His oration lasted for nearly an hour, and consisted of new roars against American war-mongering. In his address the other day before the General Assembly of the United Matisms, he astonished people by naming private individuals. It's rather unusual for the plenipotentiary of a great power to signal out mere private persons for denunciation before an international congress, But he did it then - andhe did it all

The headline of the day is a British announcement that Great Britain is going to withdraw from Palestine. The London government is resolved to give up its mandate over the Holy Land, and plans to take out its troops - "at an early date", says the announcement.

All this was disclosed today to the General Assembly of the United Nations sitting as a committee - disclosed by British Colonial Secretary Arthur Creech Jones, By explained that the London government would not undertake to enforce a settlement not satisfactory to both parties - Jows and Arabs. TIt is well known, of course, that the makezamandralandanger Arabs are dead against the settlement recommended by the U.H. Investigating Commission that studied the problem - the recommendation being to partition Palestine into Jewish and Arab states. The British Colonial Secretary stated today that Great Britain advocates a Jewish homeland in Palestine, under the auspices of the United Mations, but Britain will not J.H. settlement by force. assume the job of imposing the

That will be a task for the world organization itself. Hence the decision - a British withdrawal from Palestine, a renunciation of the mandate, and an evacuation of the British troops outthere "at an early date."

This declaration, definite and decisive, came as a surprise to haxe the world organization - which now faces the prospect of having to do its own job of putting into effect any Palestine plan that it may adopt. If force is needed to Palestine, the U.H. will have to provide it. QOD on-Which mes is accompanied by word from Jerusalem telling of a mass demonstration to be staged by the Arabs next week. The Arab Higher Committee has called upon the one million, two hundred thousand Moslems in the Holy Land to join in a huge protest - a protest against the U.N. plan to partition plan Perestine.

AT the same time, there was a violent blast at the port of Haifa today - a secret arsenal and munitions factory blowing up. This belonged to the Arab underground, and is

said to have been the largest hidden store of weapons and explosives ever to come to light in Palestine. It is believed to have been blown up by the Jewish underground, giving the whole thing a sinister implication of a battle of - underground versus underground.

ADD PALESTINE

Late tonight, at Lake Success, a Jewish Agency spokesman expressed the hope that the British withdrawl would be carried out speedily. The Jewish Agency wanting the British to quit pronto, at the same time urging the U.N. to rush its proposed solution of the problem and pleading for the recommendation for partition.

I suppose what enraged the Deputy Foreign Minister the most was the Winchell statement that back in the days of the Soviet blood purge, Vishinsky himself was on Stalin's death list - and saved his life by agreeing to act as prosecutor in

Bolshevik friends to execution. Which certainly is a sort of thing to annoy the comrade and make him spout a stream of thing to annoy the comrade and make him spout a stream of the Radio bad names. Well, as a radio believe I suppose I might speak up in defense of Winchell against Vishinsky, but Walter is well able to do that himself. What does Vishinsky want us to do about these American

citizens whom he accuses of being war-mongers because they don't talk so sweet about the Soviets? He wants them to be treated ax as common criminals. Today Vishinsky repeated a the proposal that he has I placed before the United Nations, in a formal resolution - that anti-Soviet war mongers be jailed. Today, he pointed out that in these liberal western democracies of ours, we put various sorts of loathsome criminals in prison. Vishinsky cited, for example, purveyors of pornegraphy and those who traffic in women and children. He said that anti-Soviet war mongers were in in the same class and should be gripperty

ROME (To follow Italy)

In Rome, tonight, the Communists opened a debate in the Chamber of Deputies -- the Reds and the Left-wing Socialists -- supporting three motions of no confidence in the Government of Premier de Gasperi. These Italian Communists demand that the government include them in the government, because it is impossible to govern Italy without them.

The attack against de Gasperi's government was led by Palmiro Togliatti. -- Togliatti is Secretary General of the Italian Communist Party, and trained in Russia. In opening his attack on the Italian Government now in power, Togliatti said C'e of the Communist Party are children of our country -children of our history -- and we cannot support the life of Ohio and Missouri. " I wonder whether he knows of the life of these two great American states. He didn't say. Togliatti, instead, went on to boast that the Communists controlled seventy per cent of all Italian industrial works. This fact, claimed the Communist leader, makes it evident that Communists could not be banned from the country.

But, in Italy itself, a strange situation -- the Communists and their Leftist supporters attacking the government, at the same time as eighty-thousand Roman province farm workers ended their strike -- Italian workers going back to the fields to gather the remnants of the harvest, while Communist leaders hammer at the foundations of these government.

INDIA

In New Delhi, India today Mohandas Gandhi, the apostle of peace, made a strange and surprising statement. A complete about-face on the part of the great Hindu leader, Gandhi saying that Hindu India may have to go to war against pakistan, if the Moslem Domini fails to see what he describes as "Its proven error" in the treatment of Hindus and Sikhs.

The Mahatma made his remarks at the prayer meeting today, and authorized their distribution to the press. Gandhi says he will never rest until every Hindu and Sikh driven out of Pakistan is returned to his home with honor and dignity. He says he has always been an opponent of war, but he sees no other way of securing justice from Pakistan. "War is no joke, " says Gandhi, "No one wants war, because it means destruction, but I cannot advise anyone to put up with injustice. If all the Hindus were annihilated in a just cause, I would not mind that, but justice must be secured, and that is the function of the government. The People must make the government do their will."

Gandhi spoke shortly after the Pakistan government made an announcement that some four-thousand Moslems were killed on a refugee train carrying four-thousand-five-hundred persons - killed by Hindus and the ferocious Sikhs. forecast perhaps of events to follow the election of Gandhi's nephew Semaldas Gandhi as Prime Minister of the revolutionary Hindu Government in Bombay. Semaldas' first official act has been to declare war against the State of Junagadh, a Pakistan State in Western India. declaration of war to legalize massacre, surprisingly supported by India's most holy man. Mahatma Gandhi the hitherto apostle of peace. Well, I suppose even an apostle of peace can turn under extreme provocation.

EARTHQUAKES

In San Francisco today, an hour long major earthquake SON FRANCISCOT was recorded by American seismographs. The instruments placed the center of the earthquake on a line from the Caroline Islands to the North Pacific. The California Institute of Technology stated the earthquake could have hit the northern Japanese islands, or somewhere in the Aleutians. The Reverend Joseph Downey of Regis College, Denver, granted Colorado, described the earthquake as being very deep, possibly as deep as two-hundred miles under the surface of the earth. The Reverend gentlemen said that the shock of the earthquake took seventeen minutes to pass through the earth's mm surface. Officials at Pasedena, however, say that the quake was only seventy miles deep from the bowels of the earth. But all the experts agree that somewhere out of the Pacific there was a very severe earthquake.

The news from Europe tells of a violent storm - a tempest that swept the French and Italian Ritiera, and blasted across north Italy. The Mediterranean, ancient and remantic, is renowned for its blue waters and balmy breezes along the coasts and islands of dreamy beauty. TBut, that idealic Mediterranean sure can kick up with angry violence on stormy occasions. For testimony of this, you can consult the shades of mariners of the the market and galley fleets of Greece and Rome, and the Republic of Venice. Or you can sek the people right new along the agure coast of France and the fair Italian Riviera - not so azure, or so fair, in the howler that's been blowing.

Prom the coast, the tempest cut across the valley of the Po, and today in the great it inland city of Milan the streets were two feet under water. Thousands of homes fleeded, and many buildings damaged by bombing in the war, cracked and tumbled under the new blast - of wind and rain, this time.

se badly off for food already, Fice is the stable diet in the north, as macaroni is in southern Italy.
