

STRIKE

The reason for President Kennedy's request for a Taft-Hartley injunction - is pointed up by the case of Hawaii. Our fiftieth state, approaching a dangerous food shortage, because the maritime strike has cut off seaborne cargoes from the mainland. Governor Quinn, saying that meat and ~~me~~ vegetables - are running out. ~~Forming the~~ milk situation - "critical". ^{The governor} Appealing for food shipments ^{from} ~~to leave~~ the West Coast for Hawaii ^{by} no later than July Eighth. Only five days - from today.

Hence, the Kennedy appeal for an injunction - to send the strikers back to their jobs for eighty days. Federal Judge Sylvester Ryan, sitting in New York, ~~is expected to issue the restraining order - shortly,~~ responding to the appeal declaring that the Administration's case is sound.

MACARTHUR

The most famous Filipino in the world - today returned home. General Douglas MacArthur, receiving an enthusiastic reception in the Philippine islands - where ^{in fact,} he is legally a citizen. Where he spent so much of his military life - from newly commissioned Lieutenant to general. - ^{and Field Marshal too.} ~~general.~~ Where he made history with his epic defense of the island - at the time of the Japanese invasion. Later, fulfilling his famous pledge - "I shall return".

It was a jaunty MacArthur who landed at Manila airport, today. The General, wearing khakis - and that famous old campaign hat. The only thing missing from the old days - the corn cob pipe.

Two million people cheered - as the General and Mrs. MacArthur ~~and~~ drove into Manila. They rode under archways bearing the legend - "MacArthur, defender of freedom". And "Hero of the Philippines". Tonight, a guest of his fellow countrymen - Filipino Douglas MacArthur.

KOREA

The latest development in South Korea sounds like a record we've heard before - on the other side of the world. Remember the revolution in Egypt - when King Farouk was overthrown? A band of young Colonels - founding the Republic?

You may not remember that the top man in the Egyptian junta was - Colonel Naguib. *We didn't know it a first but* Naguib ~~was~~ *was* a figurehead - *with the* real power *in the hands of* ~~was~~ *was* wielded by Colonel Nasser. Eventually, Nasser found he didn't need a front man - *and* ~~soon~~ *and* booted Naguib into retirement.

Now ~~was~~ something like this seems to have happened - in South Korea. When the Army overthrew the civilian

government in Seoul - General Chang Do Yung ~~is~~ emerged as head of the junta. *Today it seems pretty* ~~is~~ clear - that he was only a

figurehead. The real authority, held by - General Pak Chung Hi, who today got rid of his front man, even as Nasser got rid of Naguib.

GENEVA

There was a switch in Geneva today - with the American delegation opposing both the Russians and the British. Subject - the international control commission for Laos. The co-chairmen of the conference, MacDonald of Britain and Pushkin of Russia -came up with a joint proposal for the I.C.C. Suggesting that the commission in Laos be allowed to request - whatever the members need, to police the cease-fire.

The American reply - "quite unacceptable." Reason - the Soviets could turn down any I.C.C. request. Hence - the joint British-Russian plan would really amount to a built-in Soviet veto. We are still holding out for an independent I.C.C. - fully authorized to get whatever it wants, simply by asking. In Geneva, the ^{novel}~~strange~~ spectacle of - Russia and Britain allied against America.

KUWAIT

In Kuwait - lots of tension, but no shooting. British troops are dug in - five miles from the border of Iraq, where they claim they're ready for anything - and specifically - for an Iraqi invasion; which the British doubt is going to take place - now that Premier Kassen realized that he'll be up against something more than the miniature army of oil rich Sheikdom.

How long will the British stay on in Kuwait? According to the Prime Minister of this two million a day Sheikdom, they'll stay as long as Sheik Abdullah wants them.

PLANE

When an airliner from Havana landed at Miami today - three Cubans jumped from the landing platform and embraced one another. Celebrating, because they had succeeded - in hijacking the plane. Pulling out guns in the air, wounding Castro's militiaman - compelling the pilot to fly to freedom. Most of the Cubans aboard the airliner - are asking for asylum, ~~Exile~~ - from Castro's Cuba.

HEMINGWAY

Tonight tributes for Ernest Hemingway are pouring into Ketchum, Idaho - from all over the world. Old friends, lamenting the passing of - Hemingway the Man. Literary critics, feeling the same way about - Hemingway the writer.

It does seem hard to believe that we won't be reading any more of - that ^{(virile /} ~~virile~~ limpid prose. The Hemingway Hallmark - stamped for all time on the literature of the Twentieth Century.

What was the greatest thing - Hemingway ever did? You probably know a game that's often played - with his works. The game of selecting the most remarkable scene - ~~from the most memorable scene~~ - from the shelf of his books, filled with great scenes. Many critics would choose - the blowing up of the bridge in "For Whom The Bell Tolls". ^{Others} the bullfight - in "Death in the ~~Afternoon~~". ^{Some} ~~or possibly~~ the struggle with the fish - in "The Old Man and the Sea." You ^{perhaps} ~~may~~ have a ^{rather} favorite. ~~different from all of these.~~

If I had to choose, ~~Frank~~ I'd go back to one of Hemingway's early novels - his ^{first} masterpiece, dealing with World War One, "A Farewell To Arms." Ernest Hemingway, as we know, served as an ambulance driver on the Italian front. War ~~maxx~~ was a favorite theme of his - and he saw the results of war at its most brutal, ~~in~~ after the Italians were routed at Caporetto. We were both there at the same time.

Hemingway described the retreat from Caporetto in some of his most forceful prose - ~~when he took up the subject~~ in "A Farewell To Arms". ~~It is impossible to read these pages without feeling the impact of the events. The~~ ^{the} agony of the wounded, the despair of the defeated, the chaos of an army reduced to a frightened mass of humanity - young Ernest Hemingway caught it all. But he also ^{gave us thrilling} ~~caught~~ examples of - courage, endurance, and gallantry. These human qualities remain among the basic themes - to which he returned again and again.

Is the retreat from Caporetto really the best
set piece - that Hemingway ever wrote? The critics will
^{long}~~always~~ debate - that, ~~question~~. One thing no ~~one~~ one will
deny. The novelist who apparently was killed accidentally
while cleaning his shotgun last night - ~~we~~ has a permanent
place in literature. Best seller, international influence,
Nobel Prize winner, immortal of American letters - Ernest
Hemingway, who belongs to history.

DIAMOND

The diamond that was lost in the European mail for four days - has an appropriately romantic history. It was discovered in India - in the ~~Nm~~ Nineteenth Century. Bought for a few pounds - by a British soldier. Then sold and re-sold -- until it caught the eye of the Empress of Austria. The Emperor bought it for his wife, and it remained among the Hapsburg Crown Jewels - until it was sold after the collapse of the Hapsburgs and their empire in World War One.

The latest owner - Swiss. Henri Lyon, sending his jewel to Sotheby's of London - for auction. But this was one time that the famous market for masterpieces - couldn't get a bid at the owner's price. Lyon, putting his seventy-eight carat diamond on the block - for almost half a million dollars. No takers.

So Sotheby's mailed the diamond - back to Zurich. You can imagine what happened - when it failed to arrive.
