Soviet Premier Kosygin - the main speaker today at the Soviet Communist Party Congress at the Kremlin, in a four-hour speech declared that war is not "inevitable": and then he went on to challenge capitalist countries to an economic competition: one, said he - that Russia would surely win.

Along the way, Kosygin also stating that
"profit and profitability" - are now considered "important
indicators of the effectiveness of Soviet production."

Suggesting, what's more, that such profits shall be used,
henceforth, to provide workers with wage increases,
cash bonuses and other fringe benefits. Those moans
you hear? They are coming from Lenin's tomb.

Meanwhile a war still goes on in Southeast

Asia with word of another Laos raid by South

Vietnamese Commandoes, who are said to have blown up

a North Vietnamese Regimental Command Post.

But - also an enemy "human wave" assault on South Vietnam Fire Base Six at Tan Canh. The
report is that it failed though at a cost of fifty-three
of their assault wave - with the South Vietnamese
setting their losses at just three.

Also war in Hindustan where from President
Yahya Khan of Pakistan came a charge today that
India is massing troops along its borders with rebellious
East Pakistan. Yahya Khan calling this - "a direct
threat to our security."

Meanwhile, a plane load of refugee Americans arrived at Tehran in Iran; there telling of shootings, and burnings, rumbling tanks in the streets of Dacca in East Pakistan, but adding that Yahya Khan's federal troops - are now apparently once again in complete control,

In the Middle East - at Amman - an ultimatum today from Jordan's King Hussein; demanding that the Arab guerrillas remove from the Jordanian capital - all their weapons; that they do so by Thursday or else face the consequences. In which case - said he - "the result will be cruel."

The Tel Aviv newspaper Davar - lashed out today at Senator Fulbright of Arkansas. This in connection with Fulbright's weekend charge - that Israel was guilty of "Communist-bating humbuggery;" which the Tel Aviv newspaper calls - a "disservice" to the U.S. and the world. Davar adding that such statements - are a serious blow to the credibility of America's deterent influence." Further contending; "it is just such statements - which bring closer the danger of global confrontation."

By order of the Sinhgalese Premier Madame
Sirivamo Bandaranaike of Ceylon - a dusk to dawn
curfew was placed in effect today throughout that
equatorial Garden of Eden. This the result of a series
of nationwide attacks - on police stations, security
patrols and government buildings.

Madame Bandaranaike blaming all this on a band of "Che Guevarists" who also call themselves the Nation Liberation Front. But says Madame Bandaranaike - who is herself a Communist - the terrorists suffered "considerable" casualities; with government losses few. Violence in glorious Ceylon.

Here at home President Nixon unveiled today the last of his six promised revenue sharing programs.

This one - dealing with Federal aid to education, include
a plan for the consolidation - of more than thirty
existing Federal assistance programs; all of which
would then share - in a three billion dollar revenue
sharing package.

The President calling his plan - "a bold new approach in meeting the educational needs of the Nineteen Seventies." Especially so, said he, in that it would allow local authorities to "make the hard decision about the best ways to educate their own children."

A man hailed as the Father of modern classical music - the victim of recurring heart disease - Igor Stravinsky passing in New York - less than a week following his release from his second of two hospital stays. His death ending a career that included the composition of thirty-five major works - among them, "The Firebird", also, "The Rites of Spring". One of the leading composers of our time, Igor Stravinsky - age Seighty-eight.

From an organization called the Conference

Board - a New York based economic study group - we
have the results of a recent survey, to show that the
average consumer remains pessimistic about future
economic conditions - and yet "has stepped-up his buying
plans nonetheless."

The Conference Board saying this "may seem somewhat puzzling;" and it should be emphasized - that when the consumer is not always rational or consistant." As many a business man - has already discovered. Of course, Warren, our wives are always rational in their polyting?

From Stockholm - run down today on what has happened so far - to those six hundred American defectors who have taken refuge in Sweden. Michael Day, a spokesman for the defectors - says a hundred and fifty-three of them have been convicted of crimes - six have been expelled - three have died natural deaths - and two have committed suicide; while sixteen left voluntarily for other countries; and - a hundred or so-who have returned to the U.S. to face the music.

Defector Day adds that U.S. defectors are no longer given preferential treatment by the Swedish government - and they have great difficulty finding jobs.
