Seven hundred and seventy six thousand dollars worth of checks,
procured from banks - and uncashed for years. Some - for sixteen or seventeen years.

The sub-coumittee demanded an explanation of this
remarkable phenomenon - and, today, Goldfine undertook to
explain. So did Miss Paperman. Explain - as far as they could,
what happened to the bank checks.
Their acoounting showed - that three hundred and
ninety-five thousand worth of the checks were deposited in
Goldfine accounts. Much of that sum - deposited late Iast
month. After uncashed checks had been held - for periods up to three years.

Goldfine testified - that another eighty thousand
dollars worth of bank checks had been used to settle business
accounts. Two hundred and nine thousand - still unused.
Goldfine - showing the uncashed checks in court.
Well, when all this was over, there still remained -
that ath eighty-nine thousand dollars. Bank checks -
unaccounted for.

Neither Goldfine nor Miss Paperman could explain.

Saying - they'd forgoiten what happened to the money. Except, they were sure - the eighty-nine thousand was not a gift.

Nobody - getting it as a present.
The sub-committee, astonished. Senators asking- how
could anybody ever forget eighty nine thousand dollars?

But he never was tried for treason - placed in an insane asylum instead. Released recently - and now returning to Italy, where he spent much of his early life.

Gif Naples, at the dock, a news reporter askedhim:
"Who is America's greatest poet?"
"Ezra Pound," he replied.
Another news man çueried - when was he released
from the insane asylum?
" I never was," he said. "When I left the hospital
I was still in America, and all America is an insane asylum."
A few added remarks along the same line - and Ezra
