## BIG_THREE

It's a Christmas present, all right .- to get news that the Conference in Moscow has produced something definite.

The decision at which the Foreign Ministers of the Big Three have arrived concerns the making of peace treaties with countries that were satellites of Nazi Germany. These are Italy, Kumania, Bulgaria, Hungary and Finland.

At the previous conference, the one in London that failed, the cause of disagreement centered around the question of peace treaties. The Western Democracies, the United States and Great Britain -- wanted all the United Nations to participate in the peace making. After all, a lot of countries were in a state of war with the Axis satellites.

This United Nations idea was opposed by Russia - - the Soviets contending that the peace sxaxyy treaties with the satellites should be framed by the powers that had made armistice xaxisx terms with them.

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That is, Nations of the Big Three, with France added in the case of Italy.

The London conference of the Foreign Ministers broke up without settling the dispute. So what have we now?

A bulletin is sued at Moscow tonight states that the Foreign $\begin{aligned} & \text { ministers, Mess rs. Barnes, Bevin }\end{aligned}$ and Molotov, have reached a settlement on the subject of the peace treaties What's it like? Mixixxitxymyk? How will it work?

Well, the treaties are to be framed pretty much in accordance with the Molotov idea at London. The Big Three, which signed the armistice with humania, Bulgaria, and Hungary, will draw up the peace arrangements with those countries A peacepact With Finland will be formulated by the xix Soviets and $x$ Great Britain .- the Unit States never having been at war nth Finland. Peace arrangements with Italy will be drafted by the Big three and rance.

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for the Soviets. However, there are concessions. When the treaties have been drawn $u p$, they' ll be submitted to a conference $x$ that will be called by May First, and will consider the terms of the pacts. The Nations at the Peace Conference will be able to suggest changes, modifications of the treaties. Then any suggestions they make will be referred to the

Big Three, which will make the final decisions and then the treaties will go into effect.

It isn't the United Nations way of peace making, as prev ously advocated by the United \&x States and Great Britain, But anyway, it is something definite -- all-round peace conference to meet by May first for signing of peace settlements with the satellite countries. The way it is being done may not be a Christmas present entirely according to heart's desire, but I suppose we shouldn't look the Yuletide Stocking in the mouth.

The meeting of the Foreign Ministers is about at an end -. and the decision announced tonight - .

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about peace treaties -- represents what they 'ven succeeded in doing. The word from Moscow is that nothing much more is to be expected. There will be at least one more communique, a final announcement, but it isn't thought that this will proclaim anything new and important.

One sign of the end of the conference is a banquet given by Stalin. The Soviet Generalissimo will entertain Messes. Barnes and Bevin at a big spread so typical of russian hospitality -- and all will be festive and cordial. I suppose that for the American and British statesmen it will be in the nature of a Christmas celebration -- ai though the Soviets don't go in for Christmas. And besides, the usual Russian observance of the feast of the nativity is according to the old russian calendar, and doesn't take place today anyway.

Last night there was a gay party at the
French Embassy. Secretary of State Byrnes didn't attend, having a cold. But his absence was mede up for,

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vocally at least, by British Foreign Secretary Bevin who has a resonant voice. Bevin led in the singing of an old English drinking song: "The more we are together, the merrier we'll be." And that might have been taken as the hopeful note for international conferences.

Some few discordant notes are heard -- like a new Soviet blast against colonial impriżzix imperialism. The Moscow radio today delivered a broadside against what it called "The Reactionary Colonial system." And this was pointed in the direction of Indonesia -- where the British are try ing to put down an Indonesian insurrection in Java. New heavy fighting reported today.
Anu fat few Jugoslav sour notes are being
sung -- King Peter of that Balkan Country expressing his disappointment at the American recognition of Tito. This recognition, which seals the fate of Peter as a King without a ex crown, is regarded as another victory for the soviets. the American diplomatic

message reiterates that the Communist Regime in Jugoslavia does not square with the principles of democracy and the Atlantic charter. Nevertheless, we recognize Communist Marshal Tito.

Here's a report on the war from an interesting source -- the Tokyo Fire Department. The smoke eaters of the Japanese Capital had a closeup of that flaming phenomenon, the fire bombing of Tokyo. So how do they size it up? Size is the word -. size size of the fires.

## Official figures were given today which

 show that in the bombing of Tokyo, more than six hundred and five thousand homes and buildings were destroyed. How many people made homeless? More than one million one hundred thousand families. So says the Lokyo Fire Department -. Which should know.From fire to crime, - They're having a
crime wave in Japan. This fits the picture in most post-war countries. The Japanese police announce wholesale arrests, more than a thousand persons locked up -- charged with various of robbery and burglary.

One spectacular crime was reported at the

City of Okayama, where a gang of ten crooks held up
the store of a liquor dealer. They tied up the proprietor and members of his family, and stuffed the ir pockets with five thousand $y^{\mathcal{R}^{n}}$ in cash. After which they drank up most of the stock in the liquor store. They guzzled most of the Saki. Not counting other beverages of a more western sort. The ten bandits were hardly able to walk, as they lurched out for a staggering getaway.

And here's word from the Imperial Palace in Tokyo. We are told that Hirohito will nit no longer participate in public religious festivals. He will keep his Shintoism within the Palace .-indoors. This was announced today by the Imperial household, and follows the order given by General MacArthur for the abolition of State Shintosim -- the Cult of ancestor worship as perverted to the uses of Japanese Militarism.

I have no doubt that Japan will be well
rid of State Shintosim, but just the same there is one angle that causes a slight twinge of regret. The

From Germany comes a sombre bit of church ness -- a Christmas appeal issued by religious m authorities in Berlin. They ask the people of the city to stop tearing up the damaged churches to get wood for tue i. - lo it bum down the Winter is cold in the ruins of Berlin, and there is little to provide heat. The inhabitants resort to almost anything to get something to burn, They go to wrecked churches and rip out old masterpieces of woodwork. They tear up the floors and chop up pews that are centuries old. They tear massive doors from their hinges, doors with valuable old carvings, and thy even burn w heir our


So on Christmas eve the church authorities have asked people to stop, preserve what remains of the churches.

Tonight General Patton lies among his soldiers. His last resting place is in a row of graves of enlisted men. He was buried on Christmas Eve in Luxembourg -- the country in which he commanded some of his hardest fighting. Patton drove his tanks into Luxembourg in the Battle of the Bulge -for a counter-thrust against the German offensive that looked so threatening then, the last dangerous kick of the Nazi war machine. His funeral today was attended by the highest military rank, in throngs. The chief mourner -- Mrs. Patton.

It was appropriate for the Vatican to name the new Cardinals in a Christmas announcement. A distribution of red hats was expected, no new Cardinals having been created since before the years of wartime -
 a great decrease in the number of electors for the choosing of a Roman Pontiff.

Most of the nominations made by Pope Pius the Twelfth cause no surprise - like the naming of four mew new American Cardinals, giving the United States five princes of the church in all. Nor was it EXE astonishing that the list of thirty -two was spread so widely over the world, new Cardinals in Nineteen countries contriver thereby eliminating the traditional majority of Italians in the sacred college. But it is unexpected to find - a Chinese Cardinal. The explanation lies in the increasing importance of Christianity in the Far East.

There is one surprise of omission - no Irish Cardinal named. Of course there is no lack of Irish names in the college of Cardinals - four of the

five Americans being人 Ireland, itself, so long a bastion of Roman catholicism is left without a red hat. Hexran One wonders - why? Today, Christmas Eve, Pope Pius the Twelfth followed the naming of the Cardinals with a Christmas message -- in which he gave a warning against Totalitarianism, the despotic rule of governments over lives of their citizens. "The typranny of the total state must be brought to an end in the world," declared derailed the Pontiff.

In France all the evening newspapers tonight reported a thing not yet officially disclosed devaluation the ${ }^{\text {dumaxabl }} \boldsymbol{N}^{\text {of }}$ the franc. There is journalistic unanimity in saying that an announcement will be made tonight men or tomorrow morning - an announcement that the value of the franc will be cut.

Right now the unit of French currency is, at least theoretically - fifty-francs to the dollar. The cut will be drastic - the value of the franc to be fixed at four-hundred-and-eighty to the pound, or about a-hundred-and-nineteen to the dollar. A devaluation move by the Degaulle government has been talked of for nim weeks. Now it is about to happen - according to the French newspapers.

## U.N.O.

A vigorous declaration on the subject of a

- site for the United Nations was made in Washington today -- by Prime Minister Frazer of New Zealand. He's on his way to the first meeting of the General Assembly of the J.N.O. which will be held in London and on January Tenth. At this meeting the Assembly will finally decide on $\boldsymbol{a}^{\text {permanent }}$ site and the New Zealand Premier favors Hyde Park, home of the late President Roosevelt.

The question has been a subject of lively debate. First it was a question of -- Europe or America. America won out. Then -- would it be East Coast or West Coast? The decision was -- East Coast. And now, the U.N.O. has still to make up its mind -what place on the East Coast of the United States will be the permanent site of the United Nations Organization

favors is -- Hyde Park.
In Washington today, Prime Minister Frazer stated that he is going to the meeting of the U.N.O. Assembly in London to fight for two things. One the abolition of th: veto power o the Big Three. He says the absolute veto, which was adopted at the demand of Soviet russia, is undemocratic and against the spirit of the United Nations xi -- and an injustice to the smaller countries.

The other thing that he intends to champion * is -- the Roosevelt Home Town.

The kind of argument that he is going to put up before the assembly of the U.N.O. Was illustrated in Washington today, when he gave a sort of remeratixx rehearsal. Championing the town in Butches County, he sounded like a local Ditches County booster: "A more beautiful place couldn't be found," he exclaimed fervently. "Hyde Park is only sixty miles from New York, with marvelous highways, the scenic Hudson and the beautiful Catskills."

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Prime Minister, we inhabitants of Ditches County appreciate that.

The Army Air force is investigating the strange case of a C-47 Transport Plane which flew for a thousand miles without a crew, and crashed near Chillicothe, Ohio.
