## SYRIA

Syria has accepted an offer of mediation - by King
Sad of Saudi Arabia. Who has intervened in the crisis

- caused by Syrian-Soviet accusations. The talk - that
an attack on Syria is planned by Turkey, at the
instigation of the United States. Which is denied, of course, by the Turks, and by our own government.

Earlier in the day, the Syrians denied the they had accepted mediation by His Majesty, Sand 'al Sard. But now - confirm this. With added word that the Chiefof -Staff of the Syrian army is flying from Damascus to Riyadh: the Saudi Arabian capital, to confer - with the King.

Reports are that the Turkish government, also, has accepted the mediation offer - although this is not yet officially confirmed.

Apparently, there's to be a sort of peace
conference - to terminate a noisy war of words. Mere propaganda blasting, thus far, b plenty dangerous.

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Today, in London, the British government sent
messages to the members of the British Commonwealth. Saying -
that the danger of a Mid-Eastern war has diminished. Britain, particularly, dismisses the possibility of a Turkish attack on Syria. Informing other governments, we hear - that the Turks have only one division of troops on the Syrian frontier. Not three divisions and eight hundred tanks - as the Syrians haw been claiming.

On the Soviet side, the propaganda barrage continues but with less violence., $\mathbf{4 x}$ ans: The Moscow Radio still keeps up talk
the ataman about a Turkish-American attack on Syria. But this has become quieter - with less of the "Sputnik" rocket-rattiing brand of noise.

After which he played the part of an anti-Communist refugee. But now - he has gone back to Red Hungary.

## TNDONESIA

From far off Indonesia - news of more trouble on the
jungled island of Celebes. A pitched battle - between
govermment soldiers and rebels of the "Darul Isiam". Which is
a fanatic Moslem faction - demanding a regime strictly
religious, and according to the Koran. The/ "Darul Islam"
insurgents keep Celebes in a state of chronic warfare. Their
latest effort - an attack on an Indonesian army garrison.

Which they besieged - only to be beaten off when government reinforcements arrived. Last week, the rement weo, the

Indonesian army reported a clash with "Darul Isiam" in the jungles of Borneo. The Moslem fanatics making trouble - on one island after another.

Near the border of Turkey and Greece, today, rescue workers were digging into the smoldering wreckage - of a railway disaster. A collision, when the Orient Express, bound from Istanbul to Paris - ran into a local train. Eighty-one persons killed - one hundred and twenty injured. Passenger cars hurled and broken into shattered wreckage. Fires bra breaking out - in the debris. Tragic accident, befalling - a once famous train.

Time was - when the Orient Express was the plush
train of Europe. Far famed - for luxurious travel by
miliionaires and international spies. Fiction writers placed their tales of intrigue and espionage - aboard the orient

That was before the Second World War - and the
closing down of the Iron Curtain. Which cut across the railroad between Istanbul and Paris. Recently, however, that barrier was opened the famous train running again.

But now - under depressing circumstances. Unable to compete for the luxury trade.

## SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court struck another blow, today---at
racial segregation in Southern schools. Rejecting an appeal
from a court order - calling for the desegregation of public schools at Norfolk and Newport News, Virginia. The Virginia
legislature passed a "pupil placement act" - for the purpose of
getting around school integration. Which was pronounced
unconstitutional - by a local federal court. Virginia then
O made an appeal to the high tribunal. But the Supreme Court rejects the appeal - and, in effect, ordered Negro pupils to be admitted into schools at Norfolk and Newport News.

Other Southern states have adopted similar "pupil
placement" laws, and regarded the Virginia appeal - as a test
case of their own status. Today's decision leaving them,
should
apparently, with little hope, if they/go to the Supreme Court.

There's one business concern that has - eleven of the eighteen highest paid executives in this country. Bethlehem

- Steel - according to Senate investigators. Who add - that the top money for any big industrialist was earned by Eugene Grace, Chairman of the Board of Bethlehem. Last year, his income from the Company was - eight hundred and nine thousand dollars.

At a hearing today, Senator Kefauver of Tennessee asked questions about the payment of big salaries and bonuses. The President of Bethlehem Steel defended the system as one of "incentive payment". With top men spurred on - by the payment of bonuses.

The Senators are investigating the hike in the price - of steel during the summer. Which Bethlehem officials defend as necessary - considering increasing costs.

London reports on an interesting question. Will Queen Elizabeth, returning to Britain, have to pay duty on gifts she receives in America? Which has a considerable mataters meaning - considering the value of one particular present.

A mink coat, given to her by a group of American mink breeders.

London experts have a report on the fur, and say - the fana
skins are so fine and well matched, that it is hard to put a
price on it. But the figure would be - high in the thousands of dollars.

The British duty on imported furs is one of the
highest. Thirty per cent of the purchase price - and then
rifty per cent on top of that. So Her Majesty would have to pay quite a few Pounds, if the duty were collected Legally, she doesn't have to - since taxes are collected by the Crown. In a technical sense, the Queen would be collecting the duty from herself. But, according to long tradition, members of the royal family pay customs on imports for their own personal use. Not, however, when it's a gift received on a tour of state.

That's considered "official", and is immune from taxation.

Queen Elizabeth certainly is on a tour of state over
here, and that would seem to be that - no duties on the mink coat.

New York received Queen Elizabeth with a thundering ovation, today. Roaring cheers, bands playing - jubilant noise of every sort. So how did Her Britannic Majesty reply? With exclamations - feminine exclamations of "Oh" and $A h^{\prime}$. Of course, the Queen made speeches too - brief addresses in reply to speeches of welcome. But the most aniable things quoted in the news dispatches were - those exclamations.

The royal party arrived at Staten Island by train $3 x$
from Washington, - taking a ferry boat across to Manhattan. When they passed the Statue of Liberty, the Queen gazed and exclaimed: "Isn't that nice?"

The famous Manhattan skyline was straight ahead, and this time her exclamation was: "How exciting!"

Three helicopters buzzed overhead, and on the bay a flotilla of fire-boats spouted huge cormen water. "My gamax gray goodness, my goodness, my goodness!" exclaimed the Queen.

But she had much more to exclaim about, if she
wasn't worn out when it was all through. A ticker-tape reception, axus drove through the financial district, With tens of thousands of people - lining Broadway. A ceremony at City Hall, then the Mayor's luncheon at the Waldorf attended by seventeen hundred people. A trip to the United Nations - with three thousand people jamming around. All followed by a ball, with forty-five hundred in attendance. The queen, shaking a total of nearly three thousand hands. And - a dinner, given by the English-Speaking Union and the Pilgrims of America. Seven thousand people - attending that. For a bit of spice, there were a few pickets with placards, protesting against the royal visit. Irish extremists - against all things British.
