Tologic Supreme Court decision in the Tidelands dispute -- has a dramatic and historic angle in the case of Texas. Louisiana was also involved in the suit to decide who owns the offshore lands - which, along the gulf coast are righ in oil. But the Louisiana case was identical with that of California, which the Supreme Court decided three years ago - ruling that the federal government owns the tidelands and the oil. Louisiana ax was admitted to the union under pretty much the same terms as California -- but, it was different with Texas.

The Texans pointed to the fact that their state was an independent republic, and came into the union by virtue of a treaty - a pact between sovereign countries. And, Texas, in the treaty that provided for annexation, did not surrender to the federal government rights to its underwater coastal area.

The Supreme Court disregarded that argument. But, in the case of Texas, it was a split

decision, four to two - with three justices not voting. While in the Louisians affair, the decision was unanimous.

Today's ruling will undoubtedly incite new moves in Congress - to pass a law granting the ownership of the Tidelands to the states. But President Truman has indicated that he will veto any such bill.

There is immediate bitter reaction in the south against the decision by the Supreme Court forbidding the segregation of negroes in railroad dining cars and state universities. Three decisions were handed down today - but the court did not say that segregation, in itself, is unconstitutional. The verdicts concerned individual issues. The court decided that railroad dining cars, under the interstate commerce law, must serve all passengers, no matter what color. Also that the law school of the University of Texas and of the University of Oklahoma must admit negro students - on the ground that facilities provided for them right now are inferior.

The southern reaction is highlighted by

Covernor Herman Talmadge of Georgia - who defice the

Supreme Court. He states: as long as I am governor,

negroes will not be admitted to white schools.

The White House agrees to reconsider

President Truman's request for authority to arm, any
nation menaced by Soviet Russia. This, under the
proposal to put up one billion, two hundred and
twenty-two million dollars, as a second installment of
money to help the free nations defend themselves.

Today, Senator Vandenberg of Michigan,
Republican Foreign Policy Chief in the Senate, made a
sharp objection. He argued that the White House
plan would give the President a "blank check", to
bring the whole world into the armament program,
without Congress having anything to say about it.
This protest from Vandenberg brought a quick reply the White House reconsidering the matter.

CZECHOSLOVAKIA

We don't know what those Red trials are coming to, what's happening to those famous confessions. In Czechoslovakia, thirteen defendants, before a Communist court, have pleaded guilty - but there was something startling about one confession today.

A university professor was questioned stock something he once wrote about Communists. "Never," he had said, "Never before have the dregs of society risen to power."

He was asked - had he written that?
"Yes," he confessed.

He was asked - did he still believe it?
"Yes," He confessed.

The latest is that the prosecution is going to call thirty more witnesses - because, in the words of the prosecutor: "We are not satisfied with the confessions of the defendants."

SUB JAPANESE ELECTION

General Douglas MacArthur has ordered the Japanese government to ban the central committee of the Communist Party from public life. That Red committee has twenty-four members, and several of them are legislators in the Tokyo Parliament. So they will now be expelled - following the MacArthur command banning the top Communist leaders from all public office.

Earlier today Premier Yoshida forbade

all Rad demonstrations in the Tokyo section
and the assumption is that the way is being prepared

to outlaw the Communist party.

This follows the weekend election for seats in the House of Councillors - the Japanese Senate -- the Yoshida Pro-American government gaining a substantial victory. The Communists won only three seats.

BELGIAN ELECTION

Leopold still stands undecided - this in spite of the weekend election victory won by the Social Christian Party. That's the Catholic faction, strongly in favor of bringing the exiled king back to the throne. They gained an outright majority in both houses of the Belgian Parliament - but the margin is small.

Party took one-hundred-and eight out of two-hundred-and-twelve seats - a majority of four over all other parties combined. (In the Senate, a majority of - two. These margins are not considered large enough to form a stable all-Catholic Government, and a coalition is likely.) Today the leader of the Christian Social Party indicated that there would be a lot of political wrangling - on the subject of calling the king back.

Catholics did not win an outright memority of the popular vote. They polled, two million, three hundred and fifty-five thousand - while the other parties,

more than that.

The principal issue, in the Parliamentary election, was the question of the king. But, equally important, is what happened to the Communists. They were snowed under - a stunning defeat. In Nineteen Forty-Six, they held twenty-three seats in the Belgian Parliament. Last year that sank to twelve, cut nearly in half. In the weekend election, the Communist remnant was cut cleanly in half - twelve dropping to six.

At St. Peter's in Rome, today, Pope Fius the Twelfth consecrated an altar in the grotto they've been excavating below the world's greatest cathedral. This is eighteen feet below the level of the floor of St. Peter's - an altar that belonged to the ancient Basilica, above which the present structure was built. That former church went back to the time of Constantine the Great, who made Christianity the religion of the Roman Empire - more than sixteen hundred years ago.

the place where the apostle St. Peter was buried after his martyrdom in the days of Nero. Such is the
ancient tradition, which relates that the final
resting place of the chief of the apostles was in an
old pagan cemetery. This, too, has been found in the
present excavation - pagan tombs of the early Roman
Empire, discovered below the level of the altar
consecrated by Pope Pius the Twelfth today.

The subterranean grotto where the altar stands will be thrown open to the pilgrims of Holy
