The "Ev and Jerry Show" debuted today on Capitol

It was the initial joint news conference held by

Senate Republican Leader Everett Dirksen and House GOP Leader

Gerald Ford. The big news was their announcement of plans

for the formation of a new high-powered committee designed

to give the Republican Party a clearer, stronger voice in

national affairs.

As detailed by Dirksen and Ford, the co-ordinating committee would include eleven top Republicans in Congress-as well as five Republican governors and all five living Republican Presidential candidates. These they listed in reverse chronological order as Barry Goldwater, Richard Nixon, Dwight Eisenhower, Thomas Dewey and Alfred M. Landon.

Chairman of the committee, as envisioned by Ev and Jerry would be Dean Burch, the party's embattled national

committee chairman. Burch's first job, they said, would be that of getting the other prospective members to join him on the committee.

Both made it clear, however, that in the absence of a Republican President, Republican legislators would continue to "guide Party policy at the National level by the record they write in Congress."
