On the Indo China war front - a report today that South Vielnamese and Cambodian commanders - are laying the ground work for a joint offensive against the Communists; a drive to be launched - we are told - some time during the coming dry season.

This following a report - that the US command will soon declare a unilateral cease fire in Southeast

Asia. Here at home though - the White House issuing a quick denial. Press Secretary Ron Ziegler noting that President has already put forward a peace bitax bid - calling for a cease fire on all sides. Ziegler adding: "We do not plan any further initiatives" - not at this time, anyway."
