The alliteration President Johnson used today - spans two continents, and two cultures.

Mr. Johnson, referring to the Altiplano - and

Appalachia. The Altiplano - the lofty tableland of
the ines, home of the descendants of - the mighty

Incas. Appalachia - the part of the Appalachians centered on the Pennsylvania - Kentucky -West Virginia region. The people - mainly of Anglo-Saxon stock, descendants of the pioneers. What have the Altiplano and Appalachia in common? They are both, as president Johnson pointed out - depressed areas. Typical of the economic problems - that beset this hemisphere.

The President was addressing the Organisation of American States in Washington,

pledging American support for the nations that want prosperity and freedom. The Johnson prescription self help, and private investment. Plus vigilanceto keep Communism out.

Since January, our diplomats have been working with - their Panamanian opposite numbers, trying to hammer out a version - that would mean the same in English and Spanish. Take the words -
"discuss" and negotiate". We said we were willing to "discuss" the treaties concerning the Panama Canal.

But in Panama City, they took this to mean - that we would "negotiate" a new treaty. That President

Johnson refused to accept as a prior condition - of talks to end the rift.

> Today - another comedy of language errors.

President Chari, stating - that an agreement had
been reached, President Johnson, stating - that no
agreement had been reached. The words "discuss" and "negotiate" - still the stumbling blocks. But it
seems evident - that a real meeting of the minds is near, beginning with a resumption of diplomatic relations - between the United States and Panama.

The President asked Congress today - to pass his Anti-Poverty Bill. Which will cost nine-hundred and sixty-two point five million dollars - in its first year. In Congress hearings on the bill are scheduled in the House for tomorrow.

The President of France is in the land of the Aztecs, in Mexico City, for a rousing reception.
De Gaul le rising to the occasion with a
courtly speech, telling President Lopez Mateos - and two -hundred and fifty thousand or so cheering Mexicans,
in Spanish - that he brought the greetings of forty-five
million Frenchmen. Praising Mexico's independence.

And calling for that country's cooperation - to insure universal peace.

De Galle's visit to Mexico is being billed
as - the first of several. Paris, hinting at - a tour of South America in the Fall. With Africa on his timetable for next year. Then, perhaps the Soviet Union, India and Southeast Asia. murder. Wagner - sentenced to thirty years in prison.

Mrs. Velasco to twenty-three years. Shorter
sentences for - their accomplices.

The seven-day trial setting a record in

Barcelona - as the longest criminal court hearing in the city'shistory.

The weather story now is one of - fire and water. Fire - in the Far West. Water - in the Midwest.
In California, near Los Angeles - another
raging inferno whipped up by 60 mile an hour winds.

With a dense cloud of white smoke drifting over the

Pacific thirty-miles away.
