

STRIKE

(Another guaranteed wage in the auto industry. The Chrysler Corporation coming to terms with the C I O; terms ~~sim~~ similar to those already signed by Ford and General Motors.) The union lost its fight to make the contract retroactive to June First. But it won inclusion of white collar office workers - a group not covered in the Ford and G M ~~contracts~~ contracts.

The Chrysler agreement came just in time to end the strike which was six hours old, and was ~~not~~ beginning to shut down plants in six states. ~~Now~~ One hundred and forty thousand ~~now~~ workers are back on the job.

UNITED NATIONS

At the United Nations, Russia proposes six points for disarmament. They ^{all} run all the way from cutting manpower in the armies of the great powers, to a ban on atomic weapons.

The interesting thing about the Kremlin proposals is that they sound ~~very~~ much like an Anglo-French memorandum of last April. London and Paris included most of today's points in that memorandum - and, we announced ^{then} that we were in agreement. Now the Soviets are suggesting almost the same thing. ^{All of} ~~It~~ which sounds ~~more~~ hopeful; ~~development~~ ^{if} ~~as long as~~ the Kremlin is ~~actually~~ sincere.

CYPRUS

(Turkey warns Greece to let ~~CYPRUS~~ Cyprus alone.

The warning, issued by Istanbul's Acting Foreign Minister - at the London meeting with the British and Greek Foreign Ministers.

(The point about the Turkish warning is that Cyprus was under Turkish control for more than three hundred years - before Britain took over. So if the British leave, Istanbul *will demand that Cyprus* ~~wants the authority to~~ revert to Turkey.

The Greeks, of course, are still *shouting* ~~demanding~~ that the future of ~~that~~ island be left up to the people. Athens *is* confident that the ~~big majority of~~ Greeks on Cyprus would vote for union with Greece, *and the Greeks are in the majority.*

MOROCCO

A dispatch from Rabat, Morocco, quotes the Sultan as saying: "Allah put the Moroccan people in my hands - only Allah can take them away". Meaning that Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafa still refuses to abdicate. He says he was made Sultan in accordance with the laws of the Koran - and he clings to "His "Divine Mission".

However Moroccan Nationalists are saying that Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafa will abdicate within the next few days - no matter what he says now. For one thing, he has almost no support in Morocco - except among the French settlers. Secondly he can leave the political turmoil for a very luxurious retirement - the Paris government willing to give him a villa on the Riviera. All he has to do is say "yes" step down from the throne of Morocco - and the life of Riley on the Riviera will be his.

All the experts think that the Sultan is far too shrewd not to leave - before he gets the boot.

ISRAEL

Israel offers to abide by the United Nations appeal for a cease-fire -- if Egypt agrees to stop attacking. The Israeli officer, handed over to U.N. Chief, General Burns.

Today all quiet on the Gaza front.

Secretary of State Dulles says he ^{is} still optimistic about a cease-fire on the Gaza frontier. Mr. Dulles told ^{today} newsmen that he has made no further offer, since his dramatic proposal of last week. That was when he said ~~that~~ he would be willing to guarantee the frontiers between Israel and the Arab states. He says he's still hopeful, in spite of the ~~vio~~ violence that has been blazing for the past few days.

After speaking to newsmen, our Secretary of State left with his wife for Duck Island, in Lake Ontario. ~~His~~ His first two week vacation since he joined the Eisenhower administration. - ^{He hopes he'll be fortunate and get} ~~and he admits that he would like to have~~ ^{get} a full fourteen days, without any interruptions.

HUNGARY

^{must} ~~stop~~ stop distributing propaganda in this country. ~~The~~ ^{An}

legation in Washington ^{today}. The State

~~Department~~ note points out that our legation in Budapest is being harrassed - by the Communist police. American publications ~~are~~ under a severe censorship. Visitors ~~are~~ not allowed to come and go freely.

^{hence} ~~That's the reason for~~ today's note, ~~it~~ orders ^{ing} Budapest to stop all information activities in the United States. No publications to be allowed;- and no Hungarian films or photograph exhibitions,

The order ~~was~~ signed by Secretary of State Dulles ~~and is~~ effective immediately.

Tonight, Buenos Aires is in a "state of siege".

(A bill passed by the Argentine legislature gives the government the authority to suspend civil rights. Meaning, that Peron can crack down on his opponents. He can, as he puts it, "answer violence with greater violence.")

So, the Dictator who offered to resign yesterday - has more power than ever. Argentina, still Peronista.

FLYER

The American flyer who was shot down over North Korea last month - held a press conference today at an Air Force base in Japan. Lieutenant ~~Lieutenant~~ Guy Bumpas of Jackson, ~~Miss~~ Mississippi telling of his experience among the Reds.

The Lieutenant says that he was not physically mistreated during the six days they held him. But he was put to the usual interrogation - questioning for hours on end.

And all the while, the Reds ~~was~~ hinted ~~at~~ that he would get ^{extra} ~~very~~ good treatment - if only he would cooperate with them.

But Lieutenant Bumpas never played ball with them.

As he puts it, "I gave them the type of answers that wouldn't hurt the United States."

Finally, the Reds apparently decided that they had ~~got~~ everything he would ^{give} ~~tell~~ them. - ^{So -} ~~and then~~ he was released.

What about his medical treatment? The Lieutenant suffered a fractured skull - and Red propaganda broadcasts have been saying that he was given immediate treatment. Today

he denied this - saying that ~~he~~ the Reds waited for two days before dealing with his wounds properly.

The court martial of Major Ronald Alley of Bar Harbor, Maine, ~~went ahead~~ ^{proceeded} today. The prosecution, charging that the former prisoner-of-war led Communist discussion groups in the North Korean camps. The charge is that he tried to persuade other Americans that we were waging an imperialistic war in Korea - and that during these Communist discussions - he described both former President Truman and General MacArthur as "war mongers."

The prosecution is confident of making the charges stick. But Major Alley told reporters he isn't a bit worried. He says he did nothing wrong while he was a prisoner, ~~and he so~~ isn't going to lose any sleep over ~~this~~ ^{the} court martial.

LANDY

Navy Secretary, Thomas, announces that a special board will hear the case of Eugene Landy, the seaman who was refused a commission because his mother was once a Communist. According to the Navy Secretary, the board will study Landy's qualifications - and then the Secretary himself will decide whether to grant the commission to the young man who made ^afirst rate record.

HOUSING

The Air Force announces a new program - to help overcome the housing shortage at our bases. Yesterday, the chief of the Air Force said that the situation has become critical. General Twining pointing out that in some cases, only half of our planes could be in the air within two hours after an alert. ~~But~~ This because the pilots have to come from so far away - their homes not near enough to the field.

Today, a spokesman in Washington said that ~~the~~ ~~situation developed~~ partly because of the scandal in "windfall profits". Contractors, afraid to bid for government work.

But this year, Congress passed a new bill for privately financed military housing. The bill provides for one hundred thousand units. The spokesmen pointed out that contracts under the new bill will be put up for bidding in about two weeks.

GRAHAM

The new head of the Canadian Army is a native of Buffalo, New York. General Howard Graham moved to Canada, and became an enlisted man in World War One. Between the wars he served in the Canadian militia. And in World War Two he commanded the first Canadian Infantry Regiment. He fought in Sicily and in Italy - where he won the Distinguished Service Order.

Now, the native of Buffalo, the former Enlisted man - takes over as Chief of Staff of the Canadian Army.

TRUMAN

Former President Harry Truman cancelled his West Coast speaking tour on doctor's orders. So stated in Kansas City, by his private physician. Dr. Wallace Graham, assuming responsibility for keeping Mr. Truman at home.

There was a report that the Truman tour was called off because the ex-President was angry with Edwin Pauley, a key figure in the arrangements. Mr. Truman, described as irked by Pauley's reception for Vice President Nixon-during the recent festival of the Americas in Los Angeles.

Mr. Truman has scoffed at that report. And now his physician gives the full explanation. Mr. Truman, not in physical shape to undertake a rigorous speaking tour.

Today, President Eisenhower ~~is~~ was asked to authorize immediate income tax refunds for flood victims. The appeal coming from Senator William Purtell of Connecticut whose state was one of the hardest hit by hurricane "Diane." Senator Purtell points out that many victims will be entitled to refunds eventually. And he thinks that the money should be handed over to them now instead of in Nineteen Fifty six.

Meanwhile, Mr. Eisenhower has replied to a previous request from the other Connecticut Senator, Prescott Bush. Senator Bush asked ^{Pres.} ~~the~~ Eisenhower for a "massive flood protection program." The Senator, appealing to the President to put it up to Congress. Now Mr. Eisenhower replies that he will turn the Bush recommendations over to the Appropriate Departments - and then act after the reports are in.

LIQUOR

More than a hundred thousand dollars worth of whiskey and beer - going down the drain.
