WILSON

Secretary of Defense Wilson has taken official notice of Washington's lates "great debate." For the past several days the air has been filled with disagreements between the armed services -- differences over the weapons of modern war and how they should be used -quotations from Army and Air Force staff papers at wide variance with each other ... Tonight Secretary Wilson says the disagreements have been misunderstood. The views quoted, he said, are not official. "Honest differences and reasonable competition between the services are healthy," he said ... "But its not good for the country to have the differences, some of which are set forth in confidential staff papers, aired on a basis of service partisanship. "..... Secretary of Defense Wilson, trying. to calm the debate on military policy.

EISENHOWER

The President and the First Lady held their annual garden party today - for hospitalized service men. The party was given on the south lawn of the White House. Mr. and Mrs. Eisenhower stood under a red and white canopy for forty-five minutes - to shake hands with their guests.

The first patients to come through the reception line seven stretcher cases, invited to the White House for the first
time. After them, came almost a hundred veterans in wheel
chairs.

To their guests, the President and the First Lady served ice cream, cookies, punch, coffee, and cigarettes. These were distributed by volunteers from the Red Cross and the President's domestic staff. Cabinet members and their wives helped out - circulating among the crowd to chat with the patients. And afterward, Postmaster General Summerfield remarked: "This was the easiest of all these parties we have ever had."

At the end, the Eisenhowers walked down to the center of the lawn, to thank the Marine Corps band for providing the

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music. Then the President and the First Lady returned to the White House - Mrs. Eisenhower, pausing long enough to pick up a small cake.

Greek flag from a group of British soldiers. Then the girls fled.

During the confusion, hidden assassins began to throw bombs. One dropped into a British jeep - and killed the soldier in it. A number of other British and Exertise Cypriotes were injured.

This happened on what is called "Murder Mile", in the city of Nicosia. M Judging from today's riot, that section of the city is appropriately named.

widespread - but also more atrocious. Yesterday the rebels killed a patrol of draftees - just arrived from Paris. The French found nineteen bodies - with two others missing. The victims had been barbarously mistreated by the rebels.

Today, another big scale atrocity. A detachment of the so-called "army of Allah" - racing into a village, and killing seventeen pro-French Moslems. Apparently it was in retaliation for the number of native Algerians asking for French protection.

In Teheran, the gr government of Iran is threatening to break off diplomatic relations with Egypt. The reason - anti-Iranian propaganda broadcasts by the Cairo radio.

A government official says Iran is especially angry over a Cairo radio report - that Iranian military officers staged a coup d'etat, trying to seize power. According to Iran, the report is completely false.

The Egyptian radio has not given any reason for its attacks on Iran. But apparently, Premier Nasser is using the radio as a weaks weapon - in its efforts to entice Iran away from the Baghdad Pact.

In New Delhi, it's announced that India and Russia have signed a new agreement - India, buying oil drilling equipment from Russia. The sum involved - about a million and a half dollars. The agreement provides for free erection of the equipment by Soviet experts. And after that, other Soviet specialists will train Indians to operate the equipment.

President Eisenhower moves to prevent further surplus of crops that have price supports. A new presidential order states that leases starting sixty days from now - will forbid the cultivation of surplus crops on federally owned land. Mr. Eisenhower hopes in this way to keep the crops under control - and to prevent a drop in prices. Close to two million acres are involved.

Meanwhile, a House-Senate committee has begun drafting a compromise bill - on Mr. Eisenhower's plan for a soil bank.

The name of Vice-President Nixon's Nineteen Fifty-Two campaign manager, Murray Chotiner, was mentioned at today's hearing of a House Judiciary Sub-Committee. Alexander Hardy, President of National Airlines, charging - that North American Airlines used Chotiner as a contact with the White House.

Hardy charges that North American was involved, in what he terms, "illegal operations" - when it was represented by Chotiner.

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In tonight's report from Katmandu, Lowell Thomas tells of strange, exotic, funeral rites - in the kingdom of Nepal, high up in the Himalayas.

Hello, everybody! When Nepalese visit our country,

I wonder if they find our customs half as strange as we find

theirs. For example, before Prince Mahendra could formally take

over as king, he had to kill a rhino. But that wasn't all.

After the animal was disemboweled, leaving only the tough hide

and the armor, the king had to perform a puja, a religious

ceremony, inside the rhino. Most of the big game hunting in

Nepal is done in the deep jungle between these mountains that

ring the capital city of Katmandu, and the plains of India, down

in a region that they call the terai.

The king, who evidently is an ardent hunter, decided to have some fun as well as perform the puja. So on this recent trip to the terai, he shot 22 tiger, 10 leopard, and five rhino. This last a prehistoric monster with one horn, the African rhino has two horns and different armor.

And while talking about customs that seem strange to us, let me tell you of the one that seemed strangest of all. It has

to do with the cremation of the late King. As I mentioned before, it was King Tribhuvana who precipitated the downfall of the Nepalese feudal system, that is - government by hereditary prime ministers. Whereupon, from 1951 Tribhuvana, after forty long years on the throne, now at long last was a king with real power. Still a young man, in his early fifties, but as a palace prisoner they tell us that he had lived a rather dissolute life, and he died in February last year. Prince Mhendra had often quarreled with his father because of the King's vices - and now to keep the Ranas from making a comeback, the Prince hurriedly made himself king, formalized by thik present coronation.

Upon the death of his father, Mahendra, normally, would have played the leading role at the funeral pyre. But this he was obliged to assigned to a younger brother because having put himself at the head of the government, really made himself a king in a hurry, well then, he must not even attend the cremation. A huge funeral pyre of sandalwood was erected,

A Russian Baptist leader says there are no signs that the Soviet government intends to stop freedom of worship. The Reverend Yakob Zhidkov is head of the Moscow Baptist church. He is leading a group of Russian Baptists in a visit to this country. He pointed out to a news conference that the Russian Constitution guarantees freedom of worship - and he believes this that freedom is a reality in his country. The Russian religious leader believes that the gharge church in Russia is adequate for the needs of the people. He refused to speculate on the question - whether a Kremlin crack-down on religion might touch off a medicina revolution.

A London newspaper states that the Eden government has disciplined the men involved in the case of the missing to pullisty pursualing the disafference frogman. Southern members of the House Judiciary Committee

filed a minority report today - on the subject of President

Eisenhower's civil rights program. These Southerners disagree

with the majority. They say the Eisenhower program is a

"Frankenstein" - that will destroy states rights. They claim

it would involve so many new rules and regulations - that the

F.B.I. would have to spend all of its time investigating

for the Southerners

complaints. But this minority report/also includes a blast at

the Supreme Court - on the grounds that the Justices are

disrupting the law by their rulings on segregation.
