Former White House aide Charles Colson - was sentenced today to one-to-three years in prison; for attempting to obstruct justice - in the Daniel Ellsberg case.

Colson's sentence - following an impassioned plea for leniency; in which he attempted not to justify his conduct - but at least explain it. Colson saying: "The President on numerous occasions urged me to disseminate damaging information - about Daniel Ellsberg and others with whom Ellsberg had been in close contact; I endeavored to do so - and willingly; I believed what I was doing - was right."

Colson going on to say that both he and the President

- felt they were acting "in the public interest." First said he - because Ellsberg's alleged act "was unforgivable

- perhaps even treasonous;" and second - because Dr.

Kissinger was then engaged in peace talks - with the North

Vietnamese; the secrecy of which - "was absolutely vital to

"I suppose on reflection" - he added - "I would have done anything to end the war in Vietnam." But the past months have taught him - said he - "the erosion of one man's rights - is the erosion of democracy."

But Deputy Press Secretary Gerald Warren - then changing his mind. Saying the crime for which Colson was being sent to jail - was "exactly the same felony that members of the Senate Watergate Committee committed for more than a year; and that some members of the House Judiciary Committee - are committing daily."

White House reaction - at first, a no comment.

## BUCHANAN FOLLOW WHITE HOUSE

In the same vein, a letter from White House aide

Patrick Buchanan - appearing today in the Washington Post.

Buchanan saying: "There we honorable individuals, who, having heard the evidence, have concluded that the resignation or impeachment of Mr. Nixon - is in the interest of the Republic." "But the impeachment charge is not led by such as these" - he continued. "It is led by others - Naderites, McGovernites, Nixon-haters in the press, ACLU zealots, the 'impeachment lobby' - which wanted the President beheaded before a shred of evidence was in;" those who are bent "in visiting revenge upon Mr. Nixon - for the humiliation" they "suffered at his hands in Nineteen-Seventy-Two."

Buchanan adding that the Post "is deceiving itself, and its constituency, if it cannot recognize that this interprise is shot through not simply with politics - but with demagoguery, vengeance and malice."

The House Judiciary Committee today heard evidence
-dealing with the President's tax troubles. As susual its members then spilling the beans; again as usual reflecting the differing opinions of Democrats and
Republicans.

Democrat Charles Rangel, an ardent advocate of impeachment, saying: "It is clear - he signed a bunch of lies." Democrat Robert Drinan also challenging an IRS decision - to impose only a five per cent negligence penalty. "The question" - said he - "is whether, if he were some Joe from Peoria - would they decide the same way?"

Reverse side - from Republican Charles Wiggins, who said: "This whole thing - is a tempest in a teapot."

In the Middle East - a showdown is apparently
brewing - over repeated Israeli air strikes into Southern
Lebanon. Israel complaining to the U.N. - that Palestinian
guerillas have set up an "independent rule" in Lebanese
territory. But Lebanon's Prime Minister Sohl - accusing
Israel of "genocide;" while Egypt and Syria both saying they will "not stand idly by."

The U.S. cost of living - up again last month:

One-point-one per cent - for a total increase of more
than ten per cent over the past year; with food prices,
mainly fresh fruits and vegetables - again leading the
upswing.

The President saying: "Industrialist, philanthropist, and towering international statesman - Paul Hoffman has always exemplified what's best for America."

The King of the Indian protectorate of Sikkim was virtually a king without a country today. Palden

approval of a new constitution in the Sikkimese National
