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STEEL

Nine major steel companies today agreed to a five-year plan - designed to end job discrimination against women and racial minorities. In a joint announcement, three Federal agencies - Justice, Labor and the Equal Employment Commission - called it the largest anti-discrimination agreement ever reached with American industry. The steel firms also agreeing to restore about thirty million dollars in back pay to more than three hundred thousand employees judged to be victims of discrimination. But it was not immediately known whether the settlement costs would be passed along to the consumer, in higher places

Federal Wage and Price Controls today were removed from super-markets - food processors and all other branches of the wholesale and retail food industry. The Cost of Living Council action ends more than two years of government price regulation and affects the wages of more than two million food industry workers. Former Attorney General John Mitchell testifying in his own defense - told a Federal jury in New York - quote - "I am absolutely not guilty" of trading influence for a contribution to the President's Seventy-Two campaign. Both Mitchell and former Commerce Secretary Stans are accused of trying to impede an investigation of financier Robert Vesco allegedly in return for such a contribution. The White House says President Nixon has received more than forty-three thousand dollars from some five thousand supporters, offering to help him that pay his back taxes - but he is not accepting these donations <u>a spokeemen says</u> because the President "feels he must pay every penny himself." The IRS - two weeks ago - ordered the President to pay about four hundred sixty dollars in back taxes and interest.
