time today. A sixty page booklet - covering nearly every

of all - two paragraphs dealing with the possibility of
peace talks.

The Viet Cong high command stating in part:

"We are determined not to entertain illusions concerning
a negotiated settlement - we must concentrate all our

strength to destroy the enemy." For "only when the

American imperialists are crushed - can we negotiate

settlement of the Vietnam problem."

That - from Hanoi.

In Red China - an anniversary of sorts today.
