Freshman super-star, Jay Doyle won his third consecutive race in the very impressive time of 26:02. Marty McGowan was the second Marist runner to finish, as he crossed the line third, in 27:20. Bob Salomone was third for Marist and fifth overall as he completed the 4.8 mile course in 28:23. Junior John Petraglia, recovering from a hamstring injury suffered last week, finished sixteen seconds behind Salomone which was good enough for sixth place. Rounding out the top five was Bob Nelson, another one of the freshman stars, who placed seventh in 29:13. The other Marist runners faired just as well as Don Gillespie took 11th place, Don Smith took 12th and Pete Rock 14th.
Last Saturday, the Traveling Band attempted to run their undefeated streak to four in a row but rell to a stubbor Fairfeld University Team 28-29. Jay Doyle, however, kept his peranother first place finish while
