War news from Cambodia - marked today by the successful completion of two South Vietnamese drives; permitting the withdrawal of sixteen thousand Saigon troops - or roughly one-third the total South Vietnamese commitment in Cambodia. This of course, in addition to thousands of U.S. troops -who are also winding up their own mission in that country.
