he never mentioned Soviet Russia. With Churchillian irony, he said: "Even in these days of aerial progress, I think it would be premature to suppose that this material comes from the moon."

The Prime Minister gave the opinion that the Reds began those armistice negotiations with a scheming intention. "I do not think" he declared, "there has ever been any will for peace by the enemy - who were suffering so heavily when the truce talks began, and who have certainly improved their position in the meanwhile."

He called the present situation - "very grave." Which would refer, apparently, to a possible million man offensive - as threatened by the Red negotiators at Panmunjom, in their propaganda blasts.

He said he had assurance from the American command in Korea that they could repel any enemy drive.

The Foreign Ministers of the western Big three are approaching Moscow - on the Soviet plan for unifying Germany. The Communists world is enraged by the western alliance concluded yesterday - to bring German military forces into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Previously, Moscow had suggested a four me power conference to discuss proposals for unifying Eastern and Western Germany - the Seviet's trying to keep the West Germans out of the North Atlantic Alliance. Hew we say -- let's talk about that previous proposal. In Paris today, the Big Three decided to ask the Kremlin formore details.

Messrs. Eden, Schuman and Acheson likewise took up the question of the Red retaliation setas on in Eastern Germany. In Berlin telephone communications have been cut between the two halves of the city - and today, the Reds were throwing up new barricades across the streets.

Along the frontier between East and West Germany, the Communists are busy preparing their three

mile forbidden belt. Farmers in that 'no Man's Land' are being evacuated, trenches dug, barricades established. It isn't clear what the real purpose may be. But one grim surmise is possible - that this elaborate sealing of the border may be intended to ma mask military moves in Eastern Germany. It's an old story of the past - the closing of a frontier to conceal mobilization.

Today's dispatch from Berlin gives the opinion, however, that the Reds are waging a war of nerves. The agreement signed yesterday, for bringing German troops into the Army of Mato, will have to be ratified by Parliaments in various countries - we especially Germany and France. There's plenty of opposition, which the Soviets are trying to whip up, by creating a war scare. Such, at least, is the opinion that comes from Berlin.

Chancellor of West Germany states int that his government recognizes its "moral obligation" to the Jewish people - in the matter of a program of repr reparations for damage and Nazi horror inflicted upon the Jews.
