

In the struggle for control of Hindustan, Radio Pakistan says Indian troops have attacked all along the west Pakistan border; also there were Pakistan air and artillery strikes against nearby Indian targets.

New Delhi today proclaimed a state of national emergency; with Madame Gandhi charging Pakistan with launching "full-scale" war on India. Also, saying: "Today the war in Bangla Desh has become a war on India." The lady Premier adding: "This wanton and unprovoked aggression - will be finally and decisively repelled;" warning though - that India, must be prepared for a long period of hardship."

At Karachi, President Yahya Khan ordered full mobilization of all Pakistan armed forces; including a call-up of all ex-Service men and compulsory conscription for all others up to age sixty." So the whole sub-continent of Hindustan - once again faces a cataclysm.

GOLDA

At the U N. today - the start of another mid-east debate. With Egypt urging sanctions against Israel - for defying U N directives. Earlier, in Washington - Israeli Premier Golda Meir, discussing her talks yesterday with President Nixon, said: "I went away with the feeling - there is definitely an understanding of the problems and the Israeli way of looking at them."

Madame Meir adding that she herself had attempted to explain - why, as she put it, additional aircraft are needed for Israel. But said she, jets or no, "we have no fear - no fear of attack. We don't want it" - she went on, - but ^{we} have no doubt about the outcome.

WASHINGTON

At Washington, the signing of a new treaty between the U.S. and Canada; listing thirty specific extraditable crimes - such as murder, robbery, rape, and air hi-jacking.

Officials stressing, however, that the new treaty - same as the one it replaces - will not apply to persons accused of so-called "political crimes", meaning draft dodgers - military deserters and █████ so on, because, such a provision would have to work both ways. and would set a precedent foreign to U.S. tradition.

JOB

The U. S. unemployment rate - up last month, from five-point-eight per cent to a full six per cent. This according to government figures announced today.

The same report also tells us the nation's total work force is - at an all-time high of more than eighty million last month.

BUTZ

In his first ~~few~~ day on the job - Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz moved quickly ~~today~~ to quell farm belt unrest; announcing that the government "will soon begin purchasing corn in the open market" ^{in order to} ~~thereby~~ ^{firming} up farm prices" - said he; - also ^{to} provide ~~ing~~ reserve stocks to meet domestic requirements ⁴⁴ during time of short supply." Sec. Butz ^{says} ~~adding that~~ this ^{is} ~~was made~~ necessary ^{because of the} record corn crop this year -- more than five and a half million bushels. ^{A lot of corn.}

NASA

At the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in Washington - a new office of applications; headed by Charles Mathews - a former top official in the manned space flight program.

Mathews job - according to Space Chief James Fletcher - to manage Nasa's most important new thrust; which has to do with the application of space technology to the solving problems here on earth. Dr. Fletcher says satellites in earth orbit are already studying the planet's resources and monitoring its environment, heralding, he adds, a "golden age of space use."

VIENNA

KHETOMTHANDAYO

At Khetomthandayo in the Union of South Africa - site of the Zulu Royal Kraal, which means "the chosen place" - a gathering of the Zulus today. More than a hundred thousand Zulus - attending the Coronation of Zulu Crown Prince Good Will Zwelithini Kabekhezulu; this the biggest event in that part of the world - since the crowning of Zwelithini Kabekhezulu's father, the late Cyprian Bekhezulu, back in Nineteen Forty-Three.

The coronation and celebration are scheduled to run non-stop all through tomorrow; with invited guests expected to consume among other things - more than fourteen oxen with a few impala and wilde beeste on the side.

But they say best of all - it rained today in Khetomthandayo; a cloud burst - making roads virtually impassable - drenching everything in rain starved Zululand. A good omen, Warren, so the Zulus were doing a dance for joy in Zululand.

MOSCOW

Moscow - the conclusions of five days of talks between a hundred plus western business men and Soviet economic managers. The westerners now heading out to review their new sales territory which they say covers the entire Soviet Union; and that would have to include Siberia; hoping to close deals on items ranging from cosmetics to huge heavy machinery.

Each of the western business men is also carrying with him - a little book entitled, "doing business with the U. S. S. R." Said book - prepared here in the U.S.; in which is the observation that "Russian officials are the most generous hosts one can imagine." Especially when it comes to vodka. Further noting: That while a "half a-liter of vodka may be nothing for a veteran Russian Vodka drinker, it may greatly diminish the negotiating abilities of a westerner the next day!" And speaking of the next day - So long until tomorrow.
