The big story tonight - President Nixon's special message to Congress; as you have doubtless heard by now a bold plan for redoing and renewing the U.S. environment. At one point, actually breaking through police barricades, attempting to storm Tunisia's government house - until they finally crumpled under the effects of high powered water hoses.

Later on - Rogers pledged nearly three million more - in U S aide for Tunisian flood relief. This raising to more than four km million the U S contribution to ease the plight of recent Tunisian flood victims.

On the other side of the globe - U S Defense
Secretary Melvin Laird arrived today in Saigon. There
to begin a fact-finding mission for President Nixon chiefly concerned with progress to date in "Vietnamizing
the war.

At an airport news conference - Melvin Laird also stressing again the so-called "nixon doctrine."

Asserting that U S policy - "turning over to South

East Asian nations greater responsibility," for their own security "is a policy which will be steadfastly adhered to." In fact, he added - it could even "be called - irreversible."

In the Middle East - an eye for an eye for an eye. Israeli jets hitting back hard today - in retaliation for those Egyptian air saturker strikes of yesterday.

For year nearly two hours blasting Egyptian targets at the southern end of the Suez Canal. At the same time - Israeli ground forces engaging in gun duals with Arab troops - in Egypt and also Jordan.

King Hussein today ordered a get tough policy - in

dealing with Arab guerrillas based in Jordan. The new

rules banning fire arms - banning demonstrations 
banning unauthorized publications and so on. Forcing

compliance though, - well, that's another matter. Indeed,

tonight - in open defiance of the King's orders.

to assassinate Assaf Dayan - the only son of Israeli

Defense Minister Moshe Dayan. As luck would have it

passengers though one was killed, eleven injured.
