TOWER I.T. - Celds, Mon. Jan. 16-60.

The Navy has issued a warning against false optimism - in the case of the sunken Texas Tower. We are told that the chances of any survivors being rescued from the tower - are almost nil. Even supposing that there are any survivors - which is doubtful.

I guess you all know the facts - about this tragedy in the Atlantic, sixty-five miles off the Jersey Coast. The Texas Tower, six stories high - max was a radar station manned by twenty-eight men. Last night, battered by hurricane winds - of eighty miles an hour. One final distress in signal came at eight p.m. And then the structure collapsed. Sinking - in almost two hundred feet of water.

The destroyer "McCaffery" picked up tapping noises on its radar. Possibly, just possibly - made by someone still alive in the submerged tower. There was even a sound from the depths - that might have been a voice. A flotilla converged on the spot - with divers and a diving bell. Tonight, a **franks** frantic rescue operation - deep in the Atlantic. But - is there anyone to rescue? The sombre truth is - probably not. CUBA

Our government has placed Cuba in the same an category with - Red China. That's the meaning of today's declaration by the State Department - virtually banning travel to Cuba except for newsmen and business men. If you want to visit Fidel Castro's domain - you now must have a special endorsement on your passport. Just as in the case of - travel to Red China. So that's the end of what used to be a lucrative tourist to trade in the Carribean. First, Castro cut it to a trickle - by his vituperative anti-American campaign. Now, Washington chokes it off - entirely.

Meanwhile, the bearded dictator is must said to be in Eastern Cuba - directing field operations against the rebels. The anti-Castro movement - picking up steam. Former Castro supporters flocking into the mountains to defy him - in arms. Including many of Castro's former officers - must who recently defected.

ALGERIA

There's more hope in Paris tonight - following that message from the Algerian rebels. The leaders of the anti-French struggle in Algeria - saying they re willing to negotiate. Ready to sit down - with **Charles** DeGaulle. Subject for discussion - DeGaulle's coming referendum that will let the people of Algeria decide their own future. The rebels agreeing to that - as long as the election is a free one.

Paris expects the **Exm** French President - to make the next move. Probably a DeGaulle offer to have both French and Moslems - handle the voting procedures. Or, at least, watch what goes on. This to prevent any charge of corruption at the Polls. LAOS

Obsolete American planes went into action today - in Laos. Old single-engine - T-six trainer planes. The ones handed over to the Laotian government -for use against the Communist rebels. Don't scoff at these venerable fighter planes. They re of ret real use - in jungle warfare. Able to hover close to the tree tops '- and they re armed with rockets. Today they were busy blasting Red strongpoints - north of Vientiane. Supporting ground troops - pushing up the mountain road toward the town of Vang Vieng, The fall of which, according to the Laotian gavernment - should come at any moment.

HONG KONG

A dispatch from Hong Kong tells of old familiar tragedy -- in the orient. A fire, breaking out in a squatter shack - raging out of control, across the closely packed slum area. A thousand flimsy wooden buildings destroyed by the flames. Eleven thousand people - homeless. The authorities, combing through the smoking debris trying to estimate the toll of dead and injured.

WEATHER

The **RE** weather man is impartial - tonight. Reporting storms - clear across the continent. From New Jersey to California - from the Carolinas to western Canada. Let's look at Canada first - wherethe Vancouver area is flooded. Many towns, empty tonight. The residents - fleeing to higher ground.

To the south of Vancouver, California is being battered by waves - fifteen feet high. The town of Pierpont Beach - asking to be declared a disaster area.

Hardest hit in the East - Connecticut. Sixteen inches of snow have fallen - tying up traffic throughout the State. After three major storms this season, Hartford has to dig into its reserve funds - to get the streets cleaned.

Some of which - escapes into outer space. Attracted by the gravitational field of the earth. Hence, the moon dust, circling our planet like an outer shell.

MCNAMARA_

The man who probably will be our next. Secretary of Defense today told Senate Investigators he wants to avoid a conflict of interest in his new job. Robert McNamara, referring to - his business connections. McNamara has Elready disposed of - his Ford stock. Now he's ready to offer the terms of his trust fund - to prevent that fund from investing in firms doing business with the government. McNamara insists he's going farther in this than Charlie Wilson did - when the General Motors official joined the Eisenhower Administration in Nineteen It'said that NaMamara - is almost sure to be Fifty-Two. approved by the Senate.

Meanwhile, a second Kennedy appointee - seems in for a rougher time on Capitol Hill. Chester Bowles is slated to become - Under-Secretary of State. An appointment some Senators say they want to examine **very** closely - because of Bowles' **XTMM** "Two China" policy.
