From the tone of today's dispatch from Washington, you'd surmise - that the visit of French Foreign Minister Pineau has been - highly successful. The dispatch stating that the United States and France, apparently, have reached an informal accord, for establishing, in France - bases for U.S. intermediate missiles. Secretary of Defense Nell McElroy told a Congressional

To which he added: "There is a good deal we need to know" $=$ before we could get into production of the miracle weapon. Later wo nd:- The Defence Dept. announces the creation of a new office to direct the development of atomic power-atomis paves for airplanes and missies.
