The Russian answer today - to that American probe of Mars, Doviet missilemen launching a huge scientific space station - into orbit around the earth.

The space station - dubbed "pronton-One" by the Soviet News Agency Tass. Said to weigh - nearly twenty-five thousand pounds. If so the heaviest st satellite the Russians have ever launched. But whether it is manned or not - we have yet to hear.

MARINER

Meanwhile the news from Mariner-Four -- both good and bad tonight.

Good -- because the spacecraft is continuing its perfect performance -- in the black void of space; relaying back to earth - picture after picture -- of that mysterious red planet Mars.

Bad -- in the scientific evidence -- accompanying the pictures. Evidence that Mars -- is a fiercely hostile planet; that is with its atmosphere at ground-level -- comparable to that fifty miles above the Earth. Surface air so thin -- that it may seriously handicap a planned voyage to Mars in Nineteen Seventy One. A voyage intended to seek out -- sings of life.

Defense Secretary Robert McNamara and Ambassador Designate Henry Cabot Lodge - today held their first official talks with Vietnamese officials in Saigon. One of them. - Premier Ky, who immediately asked for enough U S combat infantrymen - to end the war; To defeat the Communist Viet Cong once and for all - rather than merely contain their present offensive.

In a perhaps related development - a U S
spokesman today announced that there is possibly an entire
division of Communist North Vietnamese soldiers - now
fighting in South Viet Nam, A force of about fifteen thousand
men. This the first time U S off authorities have
recognized the presence - of more than a battalion of
North Vietnamese, A battalion - amounting to less than
a thousand men.

ESCAPE FOLLOW VIET NAM

On another front - American officials today disclosed that for the first time - an American captive of the Viet Cong - has escaped to freedom. He's identified as Sergeant Isaac Camacho of El Paso, Texas, Seized by the Viet Cong in November of Nineteen Sixty-three - after he had volunteered for a second tour of duty in Viet Nam.

The full story of his escape 4 with held for now, however, To protect other prisoners - still held by the guerrillas.

The nation he served so well - today paid final homage to Adlai Exits. Stevenson, In a moving ceremony - at the great Washington Cathedral. A ceremony befitting the dignity, humanity and grace - of the man who represented America in the councils of the world.

The eulogy - by Stevenson's old friend - Federal Judge Carl McGowan. The fallen statesman - described as a "completely civilized man," Who "died as he would have wished - engaged in his country's business -- and man hinds.

Floods brought on by torrential rains - today battered widespread areas of South Korea. The city of Tongduchun - fifty miles north of Seoul - reported under twelve feet of water. With some thirty five thousand residents of the area - forced to flee for their lives.

Thousands of them - evacuated by rubber rafts - supplied by American forces at nearby Camp Casey, U.S. helicopters evacuating another three thousand Koreans - from the banks of the Han River - south of Seoul.

At least eighteen deaths - reported so far.

With the toll expected to mount rapidly - before the tally is finally complete.

The Presidents of France and Italy -- today joined in ceremonies dedicating the world's longest highway tunnel.

From Chamonix in France -- to Courmayeur in Italy; under majestic Mont Blanc -- highest mountain in the Alps.

The statesmen hailing the tunnel -- as a masterpiece of engineering; a symbol of the peaceful cooperation -- that Europe can now demonstrate before the entire world. This exactly as planned. Not planned, however -- was the way in which DeGaulle delivered his prepared remarks. The seventy-four year old French leader -- racked by a recurrent siege of coughing; able to finish his abbreviated speech -- only with the greatest of difficulty.

The incident raising grave doubts -- as to whether DeGaulle will seek re-election this fall. He has long indicated that only health might hold him back.

APPENDICITIS

At last, an explanation today -- to an eilment that has baffled doctors for centuries. The common appendicitis.

Dr. Takayoshi Yobe -- of the Japan Baptist Hospital in Kyoto -- is reported to have identified appendicitis as a virus disease; apparently triggered by the presence -- of coxsackie B -- and Adeno viruses. These also are suspect -- in cases of tonsilitis.

Dr. Yobe's findings are new evidence that the appendix is not the useless organ -- but a trap -- against invading viruses, and plays an important role -- in the body's overall defense against disease.

The U S communicable disease center in Atlanta today reported that there were just ninety one cases of
paralytic polio last year. A record low. Less than onethird the number of cases of polio - reported in Nineteen
Sixty-Three, The previous low mark - for polio. Officials
noting that the great majority of cases - occurred among
persons who were not vaccinated against the dread disease.
A word to the wise.

CAREER

A career note today -- from Moscow. One out of every four Russian college graduates this year -- will go into the field of communications, Newspapers, radio and television.

Reflecting the growing emphasis -- that Kremlin leaders now place on world-wide propaganda. Washington -- take note.

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From Geneva - news today of plans for a new parley of church leaders, Antended to explore means of resolving a church separation - that has lasted for more than fifteen hundred years.

Representatives of the Eastern Orthodox churches to confer with spokesmen of five ancient oriental churches.

The so-called pre-chalcedonian churches - Armenian, Syrian, Coptic, Ethiopian and Indian, That broke off from the main body of christianity - in a religious conflict dating back to the fifth century. A long time-themse to hold a grudge.

MATTERHORN

Two days ago -- a Geneva housewife became the first woman -- ever to scale the dreaded north wall of the Matterhorn. Today another plan afoot that you might say would add insult to injury.

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Eighty-nine mountain climbers from Switerland and eighty nine from Italy -- planning a mass ascent; from opposite sides -- of the world's most famous mountain.

The Swiss and the Italians to meet at the summit, for one big party, commemorating the one hundredth anniversary -- of the first conquest of the Matterhorn. Which was an expedition, incidentally -- that cost the lives of four men.

However the weather today refused to cooperate. Snow and fog -- forcing cancellation of the mass climb. The Matterhorn -- perhaps not as awesome as it used to be; but at least spaced -- the final indignity -- thanks to the weather, Warren.
