In Korea, a violent battle is being fought southeast of Wonju - where a division of Korean Reds has been surrounded, and is being wiped out.

Wonju, when a Red offensive down the line of the Central Korean mountains was repelled. At that time, we heard of enemy outflanking movement was threatening American defenders -- the Reds cutting around to the southeast.

consisted of three divisions, spearheaded by the Second Division of North Korean troops. But that outfit was attacked, outflanked, and is now encircled.

Under siege by troops of the Korean Republic - aided by American artillery and air power, they are grinding the enemy division to pieces - in bitter fighting among the Korean mountains.

Wonju was captured today - that key point occupied by American troops, without resistance) The

same tactics as the Reds are using for concealment.

They pushed on, spearheaded by tanks - and found

Wonju deserted.

All of which adds to the mystery - the absence of the enemy in so many places. Some think the expected Red offensive was thrown out of kilter by the fast patrol thrusts of the U N Army - smashing forward all along the line. Some accounts tell of a withdrawal of crack Chinese divisions from Korea. There's one dilemma that bothers the Americans having to destroy Korean towns and villages. The local Korean people are bitter, saying they expected that sort of thing is from the Communists. American officers and G I's have plenty of sympathy: But the Reds use the villages for concealment, in their tactics of hit hit and run -- a ghost enemy. So the Americans have to destroy the places of concealment.

ADD KOREA

The latest -- an enemy force attacking the U.N. Troops in Wonju. A skirmish going on - with other fights between patrol parties all along the central front. No major action, apparently.

Congress is asked to grant extra pay for fighting men at the Korean warfront. Today the Department of national defense proposed an extra hundred dollars a month as combat pay for officers, and fifty dollars a month extra for service men.

This would apply to all who have spent at least six days a month "in contact with the enemy", as the recommendation phrases it.

enlisted men - partly as a means of persuading soldiers at the battlefront to accept commissions as officers, Lieutenants. compelled to weed out all eighteen year olds - should
hostilities occur.

The report is that opposition in increasing in Congress, with legislators under heavy criticism from home. The guess is that there will be some effort at a compromise # in the drafting of the eighteen year olds.

The House of Representatives passed a resolution today, calling on the United Nations to proclaim Red China an aggressor. The vote in the House was overwhelming - as an expression of opinion, though without any fixed force of law.

At the U N however, the American resolution was not presented today - there's zzzzz a delay.

Because some countries want to make an alteration.

The resolution, branding Red China as an aggressor,

also calls for the U N to have a "peace committee"

- ready to negotiate. That's the point at issue
some delegations at the U N wanting the "peace

committee" clause to be made more emphatic, keeping

the door open for negotiations.

The latest -- the American delegation put in a demand tonight for an extraordinary meeting of M.M. the political committee tomorrow afternoon. This, for the purpose of introducing the resolution condemning Red China as an aggressor.

Balchen, foremost of Polar airmen, has been working with that remarkable Air Force outfit, which performs endless exploits of picking up castaways in the northern wilderness. Mighty important - considering those North Pole flights which our B-29s now make on regular daily schedule for weather observation. Suppose a plane, on the North Pole run should be faxt forced down on the kxxx Arctic ice-pack. It hasn't happened, but the Tenth Rescue Squadron is prepared for such a crisis.

Some while ago I told how they were planning experiments - landings and take-offs in the realm of polar ice. So now Colonel Bernt Balchen stated that, within a period of several months, a whole series of planes landed on the ice-pack, and then took off. They were C-47 transports equipped with skis. There were more than one hundred of these landings and takeoffs. Mersover helicopters did it one hundred and thirty times - coming down on northern ice floes, and rising again. Still more remarkable - between forty and fifty gliders came down on the ice-pack, and were snatched off. Picked up by low-flying planes - and towed back to their Alaskan air base.

One goal is the establishment of a permanent weather base far out on the ice that covers the Arctic Ocean. Plans for this are being made right now -- and who knows, some day they may have a permanent weather station at the North Pole.
