First election returns - in the Steel Workers Union. Final figures - not to be complete for some while. No need, however - to wait for them. President David J. McDonald reelected as head of the one million, two hundred thousand steel workers.

HTWME the first contested election in the history of the giant union. Time after time, the late Philip Murray was elected Union President - without opposition. Then, after his death in Nineteen Fifty-Two, McDonald was left as his heir. Elected to the number one post - without opposition.

But trouble began with the Steel Workers Convention at Los Angeles, last autumn. The convention - raising union dues from three dollars a month, to five dollars a month.
