EARTH ORBIT

High above the earth - estronaut William Pogue was discussing today - some of the humbling aspects of space flights. He told how he had become ill during his first few days aloft - how he felt he had embarrassed his crewmates. Going on to say he then tried too hard to do a good job - and ended up making a lot of mistakes.

"Then I finally came to the realization" - he said -"that I'm a fallible human being - I cannot operate at one hundred percent efficiency - I'm going to make mistakes - but I have to accept myself for what I am." "Now" - he continued - "I'm trying to operate as a human being within the limitations I possess." WEATHER

The weather was again wreaking havoc today across much of the nation. In Northern Arizona and New Mexico - a raging blizzard. Ahead of the storm - sub-zero temperatures all the way to the Great Lakes. To the South - freezing rain from Northern Texas to Tennessee. Heavy snow warnings are also posted tonight - in at least six states. India's Indira Gandhi was shouted down and all but mobbed today - while giving a speech at Nagpur in Northwestern India.

She had earlier received a rousing welcome. But the crowd of about three hundred thousand began to grow restive -when she attempted to defend her economic policies. Madame Gandhi finally said that soaring prices - are a worldwide phenomenon; whereupon the crowd surged forward - shouting pover and over, "Bring down prices, bring down prices."

Unable to make herself heard - Madame Gandhi then left under a heavy police guard. The crowd immediately rushed the platform - with a number of people reportedly getting hurt in the resulting stampede.

At the same time - at nearby Wani Town - a general strike against inflation; leading to a clash with police that left at least six dead.

INTERIOR

The Interior Department today announced plans to permit oil and gas exploration - on nearly eight million acres of California's ocean shelf. The area in question reaching all the way to the three-mile limit of statecontrolled waters; including a section of Santa Monica Bay. Back in Washington - the Internal Revenue Service disclosed today - it is now re-examining President Nixon's income tax returns. A spokesman adding that such a checks disclosure - is highly unusual. The IRS normally an individual's returns - in strictest secrecy. He stressed, however, that today's announcement - had "been authorized by the President's representatives." At the Western White House in San Clemente - another advance today in the battle to save fuel. President Nixon signed a bill aimed at forcing a fifty-five mile-an-hour speed limit - on major highways clear across the country. The President said we can save - "nearly two hundred thousand barrels of fuel a day " they way.

The President also signed legislation - calling for eventual consolidation of seven bankrupt railroads including the giant Penn Central - Central of New Jersey. -Lehigh Valley - Reading - Erie-Lackawanna - Boston and Maine - and Ann Arbor.

Transportation Secretary Claude Brinegar saying the new Railroad Act - will produce a smaller railway system with fewer employes. He expressed hope, however, that the new set-up - will prove the beginning of a "turnaround" for Northeastern Railroads. Brinegar adding that he views "this act not as a step toward nationalization but rather a step away from it." At Geneva - a resumption of negotiations between Egypt and Israel. Today's session - lasting nearly three hours; followed by a joint communique - saying "an important stage in the discussions has been reached." Their next meeting is set for Friday.

Meanwhile, an announcement that Israeli Défense Minister Moshe Dayan - will meet Friday with Henry Kissinger in Washington. And, from Cairo, a report that Egyptian Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmi - will be conferring soon with Soviet leaders. All of this a further indication we are told - that the Geneva talks are now moving "into a more active phase."

ALLENWOOD

Convicted Watergate conspirator E. Howard Hunt was released today from a Federal prison at Allenwood, Pennsylvania. The former White House aide is now free on bond - pending the outcome of his appeal. LONDON

In Britain - the first working day of the New Year was marred today - by the first shock of Britain's new three-day work week. Plants and factories throughout the land - laying off an estimated three-quarters of a million workers. British economists say that the figure could rise - to perhaps as much as fifteen million by next week.

The situation perhaps best described by a London machinist - waiting in line to claim unemployment benefits. Said he: "THis is grimsville, mate." Here at home - the end of a twelve-day Christmas and New Year's holiday - in the auto industry. But an estimated fifty thousand workers were continuing their vacations - without pay; victims all - of the current energy crisis.

The great bulk - employed by the Chrylser Corporation; which kept all of its seven assembly plants - closed tight. The jobless figure is expected to double, when General Motors begins massive layoffs later this month.

PEKING

From Peking by way of Hong Kong - an announcement today telling of the biggest shakeup in the Chinese military command - in nearly five years. This includes the promotion of a number of key men - long identified as supporters of Premier Chou En-Lai; in effect, a vote of confidence in Chou's policy - of improving relations with the U.S. and the rest of the world. The shakeup also places one of China's top commanders - in charge of its border area with the Soviet Union. MOSCOW

The Soviet Union today expressed its first official reaction - to the publication of Alexander Solzhenitsyn's new book, "The Gulag Arc dipelago." The Soviet news agency Tass calling the book - a "gross defamation of the entire Soviet people." Adding that "Solzhenitsyn hates everything which has been brought about by the revolution - and it is this helpless hatred which is the muse for his new works." London again - Britain's Prince Charles was off today for Singapore; there to rejoin his ship, the frigate Jupiter - for another three-month tour of naval duty.

Before he left though - the Prince spotted newspaper headline saying, "It's love;" a reference to his interest in Lady Jane Wellesley - who spent the New Year's holiday with the Royal Family. SUGGESTED LEAD-IN TO THOMAS TAPE "MONTMARTRE"
