ATLANTA

President Nixon's visit today to Atlanta, Georgia is perhaps the high point of his campaign, so far; but more than that - it proved to be one of the major triumphs of his entire political career. The President drawing a rousing ticker-tape reception - from an estimated half a million Atlantans. This in a city with a population of only a million and a half -- quite a turn-out! And those who came - were overwhelmingly friendly. The route of the President's motorcade punctuated by repeated cheers such as "give 'em Hell, Richard!" "Keep bumpin' 'em"! and "we're on God's side. too!"

The President later appealing for support - from Republicans and Democrats alike. "We will be guided in this campaign" - said he - "by our hopes and ideals and not by our fears and hates." And he added - "the idea of dividing the North and the South - is now, as this election will demonstrate, over forever.

Meanwhile, his opponent, in Boston, was pledging, if elected to name as his Secretary of Defense - one of four "doves" who served under LBJ; either Clark Clifford, Cyrus Vance, Paul Warnke or General James Gavin.

The Democratic nominee later flying to Minneapolis and St. Paul; on to Fargo, North Dakota; and then to Seattle.

CAPITOL HILL

In Washington, Congress was beginning its annual rush toward adjournment. The Senate quickly approving the nomination of General Abrams as Army Chief of Staff.
