From Paris - a report today of possible dissension in the Communist camp; With a number of top North Vietnamese leaders - said to be sharply critical of recent Viet Cong rocket attacks on Saigon.

Main reason - we are told - a backlash of world opinion, Led by U N Secretary General U Thant - who denounced the shelling as sheer "barbarism". This supposedly giving the US - a decided edge in peace talks thus far. The moreso in that U Thant - had previously avoided any open criticism of the Viet Cong or the North Vietnamese.

End result - according to Paris sources a stern warning from Hanoi; telling the Viet Cong to
cut it out - or face a drastic cutback in rocket
deliveries from the North.

Here at home - another ray of hope today from Defense Secretary Clark Clifford; who said that
"there are bits of movement now" in Paris - "no
matter how slight." Adding his firm conviction that
"both sides" - are trying to work out a dignified
and honorable st settlement of the war; that "we will
begin to get some progress" -- as soon as "we get
to the stage of private talks."

Next question: What about that partial

U. S. bombing halt? How long can it last - in the face

of enemy escalation? Answer - sink said Clark

Clifford: As long as necessary - as long as there

is still "some hope" in Paris.
