The Gaillard government insisting it will keep its forces in Tunisis - under the terms of the agreement signed with Premier Bourguiba, Paris also declares it will keep the naval base at Bizerte - despite Bourguiba's threat to blockade the port with sunken ships. According to Paris, French troops will stay where they are. Supplies to be parachuted to them, if necessary. Premier Gaillard repeating - he won't hold any talks with Bourguiba - until the fifteen thousand French soldiers in Tunisia - are allowed their freedom.

ROMANIA

Britain protests to Communist Romania. The reason - the kidnapping of a Romanian employee of the British Legation in Bucharest.

On Wednesday, George Balica was leaving the legation, with in his wife. Suddenly a car pulled up to the curb - four members of the Secret Police jumping out. The seized Balica, knocking his wife to the ground. Mustling him into the car - then speeding off.

Today, the head of the Romanian Embassy in London - was called to the Foreign Office. Where he was told - Her Majesty's government is taking a serious view of the incident. Asking just why Balica was kidnapped - and demanding to sit in on his trial, if any.

Our government is setting up special decontamination squads - to protect the public from atomic dust. So announced in a joint statement by the Defense Department and the atomic energy commission.

The reason for the decontamination teams—
they'll go into action in case planes or trucks
carrying nuclear weapons - happen to crack up. We
are told accidents involving nuclear explosions are almost impassible. The weapons, not
assembled while they re being transported. The
chance of an explosion - about one in a million.

But since the chance is there - the government wants to be prepared for any emergency. So if an accident does cause an atomic blast - decontamination teams will move in guickly - to clean up the area.

British Intelligence reports - Russia's intercontinental ballistic missile will not be a major threat for at least three years. London, admitting that Khrushchev has his five thousand mile weapon all right. But adding it's not accurate enough - for long range bombardment. Besides,

Moscow isn't producing enough of these missiles - to launch a surprise attack. By the time they re ready - Britain and America will have a deterrent. That intermediate rocket bases mean near enough to Russia - for immediate retaliation.

The Navy announces plans - for its first three atomic submarines - carrying rockets. They'll cost around three hundred million dollars - and they re expected to be ready for action by Nineteen Each to weigh close to six thousand tons. The largest subs in the world. They in have what the Navy calls, a "revolutionary new navigation system." And Cach will carry sixteen missiles -"Polaris" with a range of fifteen hundred miles. The "Polaris" can be fired from below the surface of the sea. The idea being that atomic submarines will be able to attack targets on land - without being spotted.

Newsmen who cover tough assignments - should have some sympathy for those French writers who were taken for a ride aboard the Soviet jet - the TU-104. This is the plane Moscow is booming # as the answer to commercial flying in the jet age. The French newsmen, first in the west to fly in it.

They say they were scared stiff - right from the take-off, at Orly Field. The T U - 104 just managed to get into the air - or it would have gone off the runway. Once in the sir, the whole plane shook - because the jets are built into the rear of the fuselage. The roar of those jets, so loud conversation was xxxx impossible. Add to this. heat of eighty-six degrees - because the Soviets don't bother about regulating cabin temperature. Finally, when the pilot brought his plane down one wing shook so violently, the passengers were afraid it would come off.

The French newsmen, staggering out for a quick shot of cognac. Then, telling everyone within

hearing - the Soviet T U - 104 doesn't begin to rival the French "Caravelle". The "Caravelle" has only half the jet power of the Russian plane, But it takes off on half the length of the Orly runway - climbs quickly - and flies its passengers in comfort and quiet. So these French newsmen aren't a bit interested - in an announcement that the T U 104 will be put on the route between Paris and Prague.

At Little America, down there near the South

Pole - American explorers are talking about what they

call "the Rocky Mountains of the Antarctic." A new

mountain range discovered. First, scientists came

upon the peaks - during a thousand mile trek across

the icy wastes. Then, planes went out to map the

area. All of the data, now accumulated at Little

America. And the verdict is - a new mountain range

has been discovered - comparable in size to our

Rocky Mountains.

These peaks run between the Sentinel Mountains and the Pensacola Mountains. So it seems that all three ranges - must belong to the same system. And some of the newly discovered peaks are giants - rising perhaps as much as twenty thousand feet above the ice. So they re not far wrong - in Little America - when they talk about the "Rocky Mountains of the Antarctic."

The Russians have just released information about that volcanic eruption on the great Kamchatka

peninsula in Nineteen Fifty Six. That peninsula has a

number of live volcanoes. For over a year, rumors about

the eruption have been seeping out of Russia. Now the

Soviet Journal, "Nature", gives us the details. Calling

this eruption - worse than an atomic explosion.

The blast, shaking the entire Kamchatka Peninsula.

Boulders, hurled out - at twice the speed of sound.

Milten lava - pouring out of the crater like a river going over its banks. Air waves created - ten times as powerful as those of the hydrogen bomb. A dense cloud of pitch black smoke - rising thousands of feet into the sky - darkening the sun over the peninsula.

Don, Soviet scientists call that Kamchatka eruption - "one of the most titanic explosions of a volcano, in all human history."
