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Good Evening Everybody :

The Weather Bureau report "cold wave coming"sounds like an understatement so far as Montana is concerned tonight. The thermometer plunging fifty degrees - within twenty-four hours. Now thirty below. Also an Arctic wind whipping up a blizzard - across the great plains.

Towns isolated, schools closed, communication
lines down, highways littered with abandoned cars - and most of the Rocky Mountain passes blocked by snow.

With the Eighty-Eighth Congress convened - President

Kennedy is preparing three major documents for delivery on Capitol Hill. First - the State of the Union message, on Monday Second - the budget, on Thursday. Finally - the annual economic report, on the following Monday.

The President will read his State of the Union message as usual - before a joint meeting of the Senate and the House. The presidential address, to be carried live - over radio and TV.

The tidal wave that hit the coast of

Portugal today - was a freak. A wall of water some
thirty feet high - almost before anyone realized what
was happening.

The fishermen - waiting for the weather to
clear, were chatting, smoking - mending their nets.

Completely unaware - of what was bearing down on them.

Suddenly one shouting "run". But too late.

Instinctively, the fishermen grabbed hands -
in an effort to avoid being swept away. And then they disappeared under tons of water. Eighty of them engulfed. Seventeen drowned.

Lisbon meteorologists are trying to find out
what caused this unexpected tidal wave. They surmise
that it was the long range result of storms out in the

Atlantic.

Next for America in space, Mars. A robot
laboratory, to ride a rocket - into orbit around the
sun. Its instruments, to take a good look at Mars -
from a distance of a few thousand miles. The same as
with venus, to find out whether there's life on the
legendary Red planet of our solar system. Also/there
really - any Martians? We may know - by this time next
year.

In Moscow, the vice squad announces that it
has just smashed a major vice ring. Narcotics? Well -
the Kremlin definition of vice is broader than ours. The

Moscow underground has been turning out platters of -

Benny Goodman, Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, and so
on. Selling their wares to cool cats - in the Soviet capital.

This so called jazz vice ring smashed by the Moscow police, Dick - who aren't a bit cool.

The government of Formosa draws a picture of -increased guerrilla activity against the Reds on the mainland. Chiang Kai Shek's commandos, landing by night - from small craft. Then moving inland - to attack military and civilian installations.

The biggest operation revealed today - the
destruction of a power plant in a gold mine. The commandos from Formosa, slipping past the Communist guards - at night, $\}$ Then
Planting stack e dynamite, - be re sneaksnglouts Making their way to the shore - where they were picked up by one of Chiang's motor launches.

Behind them - a terrific explosion. The power plant up, and
going stayúnLetor. With it - more than one hundred red soldiers, And - six Russian technicians.

Last night we had a tape recording of my
visit to Jakarta in the course of which I noted that
a number of attempts have been made - on the life of Indonesian strongman Sukarno.

Tonight, from Jakarta, we have a dispatch telling of five would-be assassins - executed. They were charged with tossing a grenade down on Sukarno's car - the grenade that bounded off - landing in the street, killing - four bystanders, and injuring - twentyseven.

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And now another tape. Here we are again
on the other side of the world.

Kennedy's cabinet I had a briefing from one of our present day top experts on India. By the way, Secretary of Commerce Luther Hodges is an impressive man. If all the members of the Kennedy Cabinet are up to kim his standard then the President has a strong cabinet indeed. Secretary Hodges is a southern Democrat, a keen business man, a natural diplomat. An able man.

The expert who briefed us pointed out that India is the richest potential market that we have anywhere in the world. "India with its four hundred and fifty million people", said he, "is a far greater market than the entire continent of Africa."

Then he continued: "We have no choice. We must help India, in our own self interest. Because," he went on, "if India goes Communist, then so will all of asa Asia, from Greece, in Europe to Hawaii in mid-Pacific."

And he added: "that would mean two-thirds of the people on this planet would have three-fourth of the world's

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economic resources." Then he asked the question: "How could one third of the world's inhabitants, with only one fourth of the world's resources maintain a world balance of power?" Incidentally, he told us the number of Americans visiting India this year has dewar dropped way down - cut in half because of the war.

I really came to India to see the Dalai Lama, visit
him at his retreat in the Himalayas where he t now lives
in exile. And I hope to have much to tell you about him and about the Tibetans in the next day or so.
