speaking in New Orleans today despite reports of a possible assassination plot, President Nixon told the V-F-W National Convention that he personally ordered the secret bombing of Cambodia four years ago - did it to save American lives and bring a quicker end to the Vietnam War. He also said that "appropriate members of Congress" were informed of the action - which Cambodian Prince Sihanouk also had approved. The President added - "I'm proud of what we've done."

As he delivered his address inside the huge Rivergate

Auditorium in downtown New Orleans, a small army of Secret

Service men, F-B-I agents and police were on the alert

because of a reported plot against the President's life.

Earlier, he had agreed to abandon plans for a motorcade

arrival long the city's famed Canal Street. But he did

refuse any suggestion to cancel terms the visit altogether.

To head off any possible assassination attempt, police sought a former New Orleans policeman who had tried to

throw a burning American flag on the Presidential car three years ago.

Without mentioning the reported plot during his thirtyminute speech, the President told the cheering delegates that "if American soldiers in the field were similarly threatened again, " - said he - "I'd make the same decision as I did in Nineteen-Sixty-Nine. The suggestion that those enemy staging areas in Cambodia were neutral territory, exempt from bombing and counterattack, that's ludicrous -" said he. And he added - "I find that some politician s and members of the press who enthusiastically supported the Administration that got us into Vietnam ten years ago, are now critical of what I did to get us out."

The President made NO reference to Watergate during his speech. Afterwards he flew on to the Western White House at San Clemente.

order prevails once more in the Laotian capital of Vientiane - while a search continues for right-wing rebels who unsuccessfully tried to overthrow Prince Souvanna Phouma and his government in a pre-dawn coup. At the time of his arrest, Wood was assigned to the highly secret Air Force office of special Investigation.
