The Atlas - our number one intercontinental ballistics missile. Tested successfully previously - in experimental firings. But never before - as a practical, useable, weapon of war. Launched by a regular crew today - such as would handle it in war. The Atlas put into military service - operational.

But, how successful, really, was this launching?
Well, the giant missile - hit the target. Traveling
forty-three hundred miles, at sixteen thousand miles an hour - and coming down into the ocean in the vicinity of Wake Island. The target area - southwest of Hawaii.

The big problem, of course - is how to get the capsule
down to ex earth again $=$ Without burning up by friction when
it re-enters the atmosphere.

Well, the distance for today's flight was to have
been- three thousand miles. But the rocket, after reaching
the realms of outer space - discharged the capsule too soon.
So it came down - yonc hundreds of miles short of the target.
Failure? Not at all. They recovered the capsule;
Although it descended in an unexpected area of the Atlantic.

If a space man had been inside, he would have survived.

Coming down from outer space - okay.

So tonight - salutations to Atlas; The titan of old,

Plane loads of American armament - flown to the embartled state of Laos. Military supplies - for the Laotian army, fighting the Communist rebels.

In Washington, an announcement - that additional Army signal corps troops are on their way way the Far East. Possibly - in connection with the military aid for the Laotian government.

The Chinese Reds called on India, today, to withdraw soldiers from sections of the Indo-Tibetan border, Which Red China claims. The Communist contention being - that Indian troops are trespassing on territory belonging to Tibet. The Reds, of course - considering Tibet as part of their own domain.

DeGaulle will soon announce his program.

From a forest fire. When the gold rush began out there, in Eighteen Seventy Five, there were square miles of black, newly burned out forest. "Dead Wood", the miners called it and the name stuck to the town.

The gold camp was deadly enough - in the old sixshooter way. Men dying with their boots on. In Eighteen Seventy Six, Wild Bill Hickock, one of the greatest of gun fighters and peace officers - died with his boots on. Shot in the back - as he played poker in a Deadwood saloon.

The next year, a forest fire - burned out the town
 completely. But it was rebuilt immediately, Deadwood continuing its career as a famous gold camp.
