DEMOCRATS

A "draft-Kennedy-for-President" headquarters
has opened its doors in Chicago. However the Democrats
appear ready to nominate Hubert Humphrey as they open
their thirty-fifth national convention. A spokesman for
Senator Ted Kennedy says he has asked that his name not
be placed before the convention. His press secretary says the Senator phoned former Ohio Governor Disalle
with this request - but Disalle was reported as saying he
would continue to campaign for the Senator's nomination.

Party National Chairman John M. Bailey has announced that first, the convention will take up the contentious matter of seating disputed state delegations tonight after the ceremonial welcoming speeches. The credentials of the Texas, Georgia, Alabama and North Carolina delegations are being challenged - most on grounds of racial discrimination.

Tomorrow night, the second night of the convention, a bitter floor fight is expected over rules changes and the party platform - especially the highly controversial plank on the Vietnam war.

Platform writers have already tentatively approved a plank backing up the Johnson administration policy on the war - and rejecting all demands of the war critics.

The leaders of the two most powerful state

delegations -- Jesse Unruh of California and Chicago

Mayor Richard Daley of Illinois -- are keeping their

preferences for President to themselves. Both, however,

deny they are part of a "draft-Kennedy" come move. Senator

McCarthy -- fighting to withhold ballots from Humphrey on

the first ballot - spent more than an hour today with the

California delegation. Humphrey rode from hotel to hotel

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urging state delegations and union officials to give him a chance to defeat Richard Nixon, the Republican nominee, in November.

Communist sources in Mosce are quoted tonie as saying that the Soviet Union has agreed to recognize the liberal regime of Alexander Dubcek in Czechoslovakia. The Russians, also, are reported to have agreed to withdraw their troops from Czech soil - but this would be only a "gradual" withdrawal. The accord reportedly, was reached after four days of closely guarded meetings in the Kremlin at Moscow - between Czech officials and leaders of the Soviet Communist party -- although the Free Czechoslovakia radio claims the talks have not ended and are still going on. In refusing to bring an immediate end to the military occupation of Czechoslovakia, the Russians reportedly insisted that the two-hundred-thousand wax Warsaw Pact troops remain io on Czech soil temporarily -- to see that the terms of any agreement are carried out. Also, the Soviets are said to be demanding that some Russian troops be stationed Broker on the Czech-West German border as military observers.

Meanwhile, the situation in Prague is becoming increasingly tense by the hour. Soviet troops are reported to be more nervous than ever as they patrol the streets where hundreds of thousands of Czech citizens are store staging protest demonstrations, including a noisy fifteen minute general strike in Prague's main square, with the Russians replying to taunts and jeers with warning bursts of machine-gun fire. Seriet fell and the fate of the nation hung in the balance, ,the Soviet troops and wore fingering their automatic western weapons and constantly scanning the currenting rooftops, as if awaiting sniper fire.

The citizens of Czechoslovakia are making it clear - they want nothing short of a complete withdrawal of occupying forces from their country.

At the United Nations in New York - U S
diplomatic sources say the United Sauces States will refuse

to condone any - quote - "ratification of rape" of

Czechoslovakia, regardless of the official Czechoslovak

reaction to the talks in Moscow. The comment came after

the Security Council - at the request of Czech Foreign

Minister Jiri Hajek - agreed to postpone the council's

debate on the crisis, pending the outcome of the Moscow

talks.

Jordan and Israel filed complaints with the

United Nations' today -- each accusing the other of
bombarding villages along the border over the weekend.

The two sides back battled with tank, artillery and
mortar fire for several hours along a twenty-mile front.

American army infantry - supported by lowflying fighter-bombers - fought a close-quarters battle
with North Vietnamese troops today. The fighting - which
raged from mid-afternoon into the night - took place on
a rubber plantation near the Cambodian border in the eighty miles north of Saigon. American military commanders
call it a Communist effort to divert defense forces from
Saigon.

Manual Paris, the chief spokesman for North Vietnam at the deadlock peace negotiations, directed an appeal to the American people, asking them to force their government to end the war. Some observers paid it was apparently an attempt to stimulate sentiment against the war at the Democratic National Convention, as it opens in Chicago.
