Elsewhere in the Pacific Typhoon Virginia abruptly changed course today; smashing suddenly, unexpectedly - into Japan's Pacific Coast. In Chiba Province - east of Tokyo - killing more than fifty persons; many of whom were buried alive - under massive landslides. These - the result of torrential rains; at one point, totaling nearly five inches - in a single hour.

Closer to home - a storm area stretching more than four thousand miles across - threatened today both America's East and Gulf Coasts. This - according to the U.S. Hurricane Center in Miami - a massive circulation of air;" covering "the entire Gulf, Western and Central Caribbean Sea - and part of the Atlantic;" containing within its boundaries - no less than four major storm systems.

Of these - the worst so far is clearly Edith - a

"classical hurricane;" at last report, Three-Hundred-and
Forty miles south-southeast of Kingston, Jamaica, and moving westward. "A good candidate" - we are told - "for storm of the year."

At Belfast in Northern Ireland - a series of earlymorning bombings today. Also, the shooting of a British
sentry - at nearby Newry.

This coming in the midst of a so-called truce supposedly ordered by the militant Provisional wing of the
outlawed IRA; and thus drawing from regular IRA her carters
