The White House - an attempt today at a new start
-- as no doubt you've heard by now. President Nixon sending to Congress - his second State of the Union and

action. These ranging from income tax reform - to the finalization of plans for

The President also saying: "In the spirit of
responsible cooperation which must prevail -Iamb
fully prepared to work closely with members of the

Congress in hammering out modifications." Adding
that he would welcome - a "renaissance" of congressional authority.

Lest there be any doubt thoughe-the President

* stated flatly: "I will continue to oppose all efforts
-- to strip the Presidency of the powers it must have
to be effective." Further saying: "There can be no monopoly of wisdom on either end of Pennsylvania "Headed,
Avenue - and there should be no monopoly of power."

is so dramatic, so drastic, that one can only conclude negatively $=$ the voters simply cant identify with their far-out liberal views."

The Senate Foreign Relations committee resumed hearings today - on the nomination of Henry Kissinger to be Secretary of State. Attorney General Elliott Richardson - testifying in executive session. Refusing, however, to discuss the results of wire taps on Kissinger staff members. At the National Security Council. Richardson saying: The committee's interest would not be served by furnishing information about individuals." This leading to another
threat from committee chairman J. William Fulbright to hold up confirmation. But, the committee's ranking Republican - Senator Aiken of vermont - urging While quick approval. Aiken saying: "I don't regard Henry Kissinger as a saint, - what I am concerned about is the record he has made in bringing an end to war in the world."

Later on, in open session, Dr. Kissinger again

The worst toll since the London series of bombing
attacks began three weeks ago.

At the Danish parliament building in Copenhagen another meeting of the nine European common market
foreign ministers; after months of haggling mainly by France -finally approving the draft of a so-called "declaration of trans-Atlantic principles." This to serve as the basis for consultations with President Nixon when he travels to Europe in mid-November. Said to embrace "nine or ten topics" - including "areas such as trade and monetary questions;" but nothing at all
on military matters.

Jordan's taught young King Hussein flew into Cairo
today - his first visit to the Egyptian capital - since his Prime Minister, Wasfi Tel was slain there by

Palestinian guerrillas. Hussein quickly conferring with

Egypt's President Sadat - who then met later with
a second visitor, Syrian President Assad. The main
